

DOLE BILL FIGHT IN SENATE MAY BE VERY LIVELY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(P)—The drive for federal appropriations to help the unemployed swept a \$375,000,000 bill onto the senate floor today with indications of democratic-independent republican support. Despite the president's opposition, the senate manufacturers committee voted 6 to 2 to approve the Costigan-LaFollette bill authorizing relief appropriations of \$125,000,000 for this winter and \$250,000,000 for the fiscal year beginning next July. The committee's report was submitted to the senate by Chairman LaFollette, one of the bill's authors, a few hours later. He forecast an effort to bring the measure up for action at the first opportunity. The bill was given the solid sup-

port of democrats and independent republicans on the committee, but democratic leaders were non-committal with respect to their attitude on the measure. Administration republicans on the committee maintained their opposition to the bill. McNary of Oregon, and Goldsborough of Maryland, opposed it. Senator Watson, the republican leader, reiterated his objections later. In addition to LaFollette, those who voted for the bill included Senators Cushman of Colorado, co-author of the measure; Wheeler of Montana; Sheppard of Texas; Bulkley of Ohio, and Smith of South Carolina, all democrats. In reporting the bill, LaFollette said the appropriation proposed was placed "conservatively in the light of the evidence considered by the committee." The bill provides that 40 per cent of the money should be apportioned among the states according to population, while the balance would be allocated in accordance with needs. The maximum the states could draw ranges from \$112,000 for Nevada to \$15,200 for New York. The remainder of the fund would be divided by a federal emergency relief board. The director of the children's bureau of the labor department would administer the act under the supervision of the board.

TREES PROMISED FOR RURAL SCHOOLS

Enough trees to beautify rural school grounds over the entire state have been promised by Dean George Peary of Oregon State college at cost of transportation only. Mrs. Jessie M. Honeyman, chairman of the roadside committee of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs, announced Thursday. This work of planting trees on school grounds of the state is being carried on by the Garden clubs in cooperation with the George Washington Bicentennial association. Trees will be recorded and designated as George Washington memorial trees, in honor of the first president, who was a lover of trees. Trees will be planted along the highways of the state under the general program of the Oregon Federation of Garden clubs. The Samuel Hill contest has been launched, a contest in which prizes of \$500 and \$200 will be given to persons along highways who

make the most improvement in roadside beautification. Mrs. Honeyman said that now is the time to plant the Washington memorial trees. She has been advised by United States forestry officials that trees may be planted from now on through May. In eastern Oregon planting should be delayed until after April. Four thousand copies of an Oregon State college pamphlet on the planting of trees on school grounds will be mailed by the Garden club organization to schools.

Eugene and University high hoop men went into final practices Friday afternoon for their big game Saturday at the Eugene high gym at 7:30. Both squads flashed good form. SUFFRAGE LEADER RETIRES FOR GOOD

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(P)—Carrie Chapman Catt, feeling that "one can't go on forever," stepped from the driver's seat today in the national organization she formed to further one of two causes with which her name is linked around the world. "I want to give up general responsibility for everything that comes up," she said. At the insistence of the 73-year-old woman's suffrage and world peace leader, the nominating committee of the national conference on the cause and cure of war returned a slate leaving off the "chairman" which has stood for seven years before the name of Mrs. Catt. Mentally vigorous but leaning on a polished cane, the woman who years ago braved hostile public opinion for votes for women smiled with satisfaction. "Like every reformer—I know my cause will win. Final peace may come rather quickly, or it may come slowly. I

never doubted the outcome of the suffrage movement, and I feel the same about peace." It was this stalwart who embarked on the suffrage cause when she was a girl of 19. She stumped for suffrage through the far west before that cause attained respectability. She appeared before legislative committees here and in state capitals before more than any other suffrage leader. That goal attained, she "came peace" and decided to stick to it. Many of her friends insist she again take the chairmanship of the peace conference, but she declared absolutely she would refuse.
