Rate Reductions Refused By I. C. C.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Two applications for reduction of

freight rates on apples and pears from points in Washington and Oregon were refused by the interstate commerce commission today.

The first concerned rates on apples and pears, in carloads, shipped from points in Yakima valley, in Washington, to Portland, Ore., for export. It was found that the relationship between the proposed rates and the present rates from the same points to Tacoma and Seattle, Wash., for export, would give Portland an undue preference.

The second application was for reduction on the rates of apples and pears, in carloads, shipped from Walla Walla valley in Washington and Oregon to Portland, Tacoma and Seattle. This was refused on the ground that the proposal would violate the long and short haul provision of the interstate commerce act and would be discriminatory against producers in Yakima valley.

fall off still more as the year progresses. However, in addition to taxes for this year, the county also has owed it delinquent taxes for past years and if these are paid, the county will be able to apply that money to its road program and other expenses, Judge Barnard said.

So the county is at present progressing cautiously, banking on the collection of delinquent taxes to assure the road program for this year. This road program is one of the main projects in the unemployment relief work of the county, and the county court is particularly anxious to keep road work going in order to care for as many of the county's unemployed as is possible. The county has allotted \$200,000 for road work for the year, but if tax collections do not hold up and work is curtailed on July 1, the unemployment situation of the county will become more critical. Further, if the county is unable to collect \$100,000 from delinquent taxes or from 1932 taxes between now and July 1, the program up to that time might not be possible, and work might even be halted before July.

"On this basis, it can easily be seen that the future of county road work for this year depends on tax money being paid in as soon as possible," Judge Barnard said. "We feel assured that money will come in fast enough to continue the work up to July, but from there on we are unable to estimate what money we will receive. Therefore, we have written all road districts and authorized them to spend only the first half money, or the money for work up to July, and warned them not to plan work and expenses after that date, in order to keep the county in the clear in the event tax money is not collected."

This year is an especially expensive one for the county since election

expenses and insane patients costs will be coming. This, added to the fact that so many are unemployed and seeking aid from the county, inflicts a heavy financial burden on the county this year. Besides, certain funds are required to be spent, such as the elementary school fund. The county is obligated under law to send out the full amount and cannot pay in proportion to what is collected from taxes. So far, with the second half of the elementary fund overdue, the county has but \$18,551.81 and owes a total of \$52,902.57.

The difference here must be made up from other funds. It is the present plan of the county to use money at present sunk in bonds in the liquidated banks of Springfield and Cottage Grove. The county has collected \$15,093.85 from the two banks, but is still lacking \$3,141.54 from the Cottage Grove bank and \$18,867.11 from the Springfield bank. The county holds securities for these bonds, but is unable to cash in on them since by state law these securities cannot be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest. This is impossible on the present bond market, Judge Barnard pointed out. However, this money is safe and will be obtained sometime and when the county does get

it, it can be used to make up the lack in the elementary school fund.

Soil, Rock Data Are Sought at Roseburg
ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Colonel William H. Radcliff, head of the engineering department of the veterans' bureau on the Pacific coast, arrived in Roseburg today from Palo Alto for the purpose of obtaining data on soil and rock strata on the site of the \$2,000,000 northwest national soldiers' home which is to be built here.

The information is being obtained in order to complete plans for the foundations of buildings which, according to reports from Washington, D. C., will be started in April. One million dollars will be spent on the first unit.

which would add to the economic desirability of the canalization project. The survey report on the feasibility of the proposed canalization will probably not be ready until Aug. 1. Major Kuents said. The accumulation of all the data necessary to be sent to the chief of engineers, and to congress if the department head approves the report, will take at least six months until Aug. 1.

The four parties making the ground survey are expected to have their work completed in two weeks, Kuents said. Several experts are working in Portland on the possible and potential tonnages which would be carried via water if the project went through, and a force of 25 engineers in the dis-

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tract office is working to assemble all the facts necessary for the report.
