LOWE GIVES GREAT FILM PERFORMANCE

"Attorney For the Defense," which opened at the Heilig theatre Sunday, presents Edmund Lowe as a district attorney who sours on his profession when he finds he has sent an innocent man to the electric chair. No more suitable role could have been found for Lowe.  
The plot is highly dramatic and life of a man, who as a public prosecutor turns persecutor to reach the Governor's chair, until the death of an innocent man turns him disgustful away from the district attorneyship, moves in the most active court in the world—New York City's Criminal Court.  
Lowe's superb performance is given admirable support by the portrayals of Evelyn Brent, a lady who loves only when there is money in it, and Constance Cummings, Lowe's secretary—faithful, efficient.  
The plot is highly dramatic and finds Lowe, at the end, fighting for his own defense. To give away the plot would be to spoil the story, but the picture is one no theatre fan who likes concentrated action, can afford to miss.

NEW YORK, June 6.—(AP)—W. T. Grant stores reported sales for the first five months of the year totalled \$26,991,257, compared with \$26,798,796 in the corresponding period of 1931.

SOCIALIST REGIME IN CHILE ATTACKED

SANTIAGO, Chile, June 6.—(AP)—A counter-revolution directed against the socialist regime which set itself up here Saturday has broken out in southern Chile.  
It was understood the army and navy support the movement. Reports from the south this morning said the military and naval garrisons at Concepcion and Talcahuano had joined the counter-revolutionary forces.  
General Puga, minister of the interior in the new government, said he had expected some such incident, but did not believe the counter-revolution would be very serious. If necessary, he said, he would send planes down to bombard the rebels.  
Juan Esteban Montero, ousted by the socialist junta, left town last night and today was reported to be somewhere along the coast trying to join the southern forces. It also was reported that former President Ibanez, who has been living in Argentina, had crossed the border into Chile by air, landing at his ranch near Talca.  
This morning university students declared a strike in protest against the junta government, but the city was quiet.  
die, victim of a serious case of diabetes. He wanted to sell his body before he died, so his family might benefit.  
The youth's story was revealed today after being kept secret by a few close friends and neighbors of the McPhadon family.  
Six years ago, young McPhadon was tossed off a horse near his home. He suffered a spinal injury, but did not complain until he collapsed following a soccer game a few weeks later. Taken to the county hospital, where he has spent much time under observation, physicians determined his diabetic condition was the direct result of his fall.  
Injections of insulin in his blood several times a day have since kept him alive. Until physicians ruled against physical activity, he carried papers to purchase insulin.  
The youth established a small laboratory in his home. With formulas and chemicals given him by friendly nurses at the county hospital, he has conducted numerous experiments. It was after these tests that he learned his exact condition.  
"Doctors wouldn't tell me very much," Bob said. "They merely said to 'be careful.' So I found out for myself."  
With death lingering constantly at his elbow, the youth is seemingly unperturbed.  
"No, I'm not afraid to die," he said. "You can never tell though, I may live a long time. But if I could arrange with some medical college or institute to have my body after death, I'd feel better."  
Bob's family consists of his mother and father, three brothers and four sisters ranging from 12 to 24 years.

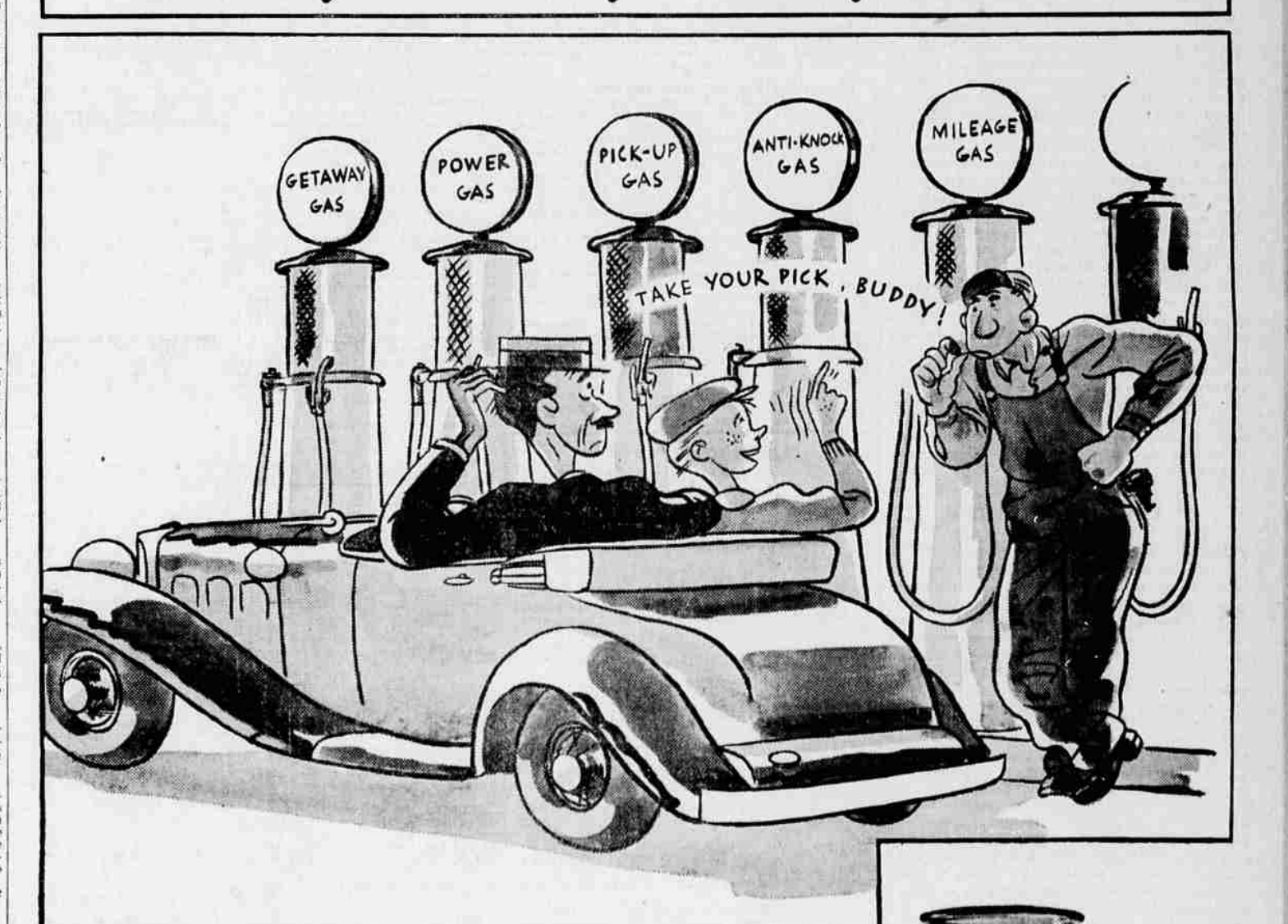
Boy Facing Death Offers to Sell His Body For Science
