

LODGE OF NATIVE SONS, DAUGHTERS TO BE ORGANIZED

A lodge of Native Sons and Daughters of Oregon will be organized in Eugene in a few days, according to J. J. McCall of Portland, trustee of the order, who with C. E. Allen and J. E. Green, also of that city, and organizers, arrived here yesterday.

A charter for an order was granted April 16, 1932, and work was started immediately thereafter on Portland lodge No. 1. Its membership includes some of the most prominent men and women of the city. Salem lodge No. 2 was organized only a short time ago and Eugene lodge will be No. 3. Astoria lodge No. 4 and The Dalles lodge No. 5 will be in process of formation at the same time the local lodge is being organized, it was stated by Mr. McCall. The charter of Eugene lodge will close August 1, 1932.

Persons 18 years of age or older who are American born or have lived in the state of Oregon 20 years or more will be afforded the opportunity of becoming members up to and including January 1, 1933; after that date only native born of the state of Oregon will be eligible.

Some of the objects of the organization are given as follows: To perpetuate in the minds of all native Oregonians the memories of pioneer periods of Oregon history.

To encourage a lively interest in all matters and measures relating to the promotion of the material interests and upbuilding of the state of Oregon.

To support Oregon corporations, manufacturers, producers, and unite them by ties of a friendship throughout the state that will be mutually beneficial to all.

Organization headquarters will be established by Mr. Allen and Mr. Green at the Osburn hotel and work will be started some time next week on the membership list.

The organization is patterned somewhat after the Native Sons and Daughters of California, Mr. McCall said, with some of the features of that organization which are deemed by him to be objectionable eliminated.

speakingly worse than those which prevailed before.

He said he had been a teetotaler all his life. "Neither my father nor my father ever tasted a drop of intoxicating liquor, nor have I," he said.

Mrs. Ella A. Roole, president of the W. C. T. U., commenting on the letter, asked: "Will people who have refused to obey the prohibition law agree to obey the restrictions that must of necessity be a part of any other law?"

Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, said the amendment had been successful and that "certainly we do not propose to exchange what we have—far better than the legalized traffic and saloon of the old days—for something that is uninformative and untried."

Dr. D. Leigh Colvin, chairman of the prohibition national committee, declaring Rockefeller made "wild statements," said government figures show that "the source of liquor supply is not over 35 per cent what it was before" and that crime has decreased.

Dr. Butler, on the other hand, said Mr. Rockefeller's support and aid would have "a very large influence" in the public opinion of the country, and Mrs. Charles H. Sablin, chairman of the women's organization for national prohibition reform, praised the oil man for his "courage."

Verdict of Self Inflicted Death Returned by Jury

HILLSBORO, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—Ten minutes after it had received the case a coroner's jury late yesterday returned a verdict of suicide in the death of Mrs. Elizabeth Koerber, 78. The verdict was unanimous.

Mrs. Koerber was found in the basement of the Free Methodist church, parsonage here last Wednesday, nude and fatally burned. She died within two hours without making a statement. Jammed into her mouth were several splinters and chips of wood, together with a large cloth.

Mrs. Koerber was found by her daughter, the Rev. Nathalia Koerber, pastor of the church, who was the last witness called at the inquest today.

The coroner's jury was composed of Hillsboro businessmen. The taking of testimony lasted nearly five hours.

Dr. J. O. Robb, who was called to attend the dying woman, and Dr. Frank R. Menne, pathologist from the University of Oregon medical school, testified it would have been possible for Mrs. Koerber, in agony from her burns, to have clawed wood and to have thrust the twisted cloth into her mouth.

The body showed no evidence of violence of any kind, the physicians testified except for abrasions on the face and incisions in the throat. No poison was found in the stomach.

EGAN SURRENDERS ON MURDER COUNT

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—(AP)—Frank J. Egan, suspended public defender, surrendered to police today on a murder charge and brought on to one of the most strenuous manhunters here in recent years.

Accused with two of his henchmen of slaying his friend and benefactor, Mrs. Jessie Scott Hughes, in a cleverly plotted simulation of a hit-run accident, Egan disappeared last Saturday a few hours before the grand jury voted to indict him.

His attorney, Vincent W. Hallinan, had promised Egan would be released yesterday morning, and when the time designated by the lawyer had passed with no signs of the accused man appearing, the harassed police started a hunt that spread over a wide area.

Just before Egan walked into the Golden Gate police station Hallinan, already under subpoena to explain to the grand jury why his client had not given himself up, as promised, telephoned police saying he had instructed the accused official to do so at once. Egan was silent as he stepped up to face the accusation.

The official board figures credit the state college with a total of classrooms and laboratory space of 205,458 sq. ft. in 32 buildings, and the university with 130,649 sq. ft. in buildings. A greater number of laboratory courses at Corvallis is credited with much of the greater amount of space.

Mr. Zorn also stated that the value of the university physical plant was but \$2,000,000 and that the real number of the more than \$2,000,000 claimed by the board included the medical school at Portland. The official figures show state-owned property at the university valued at \$4,401,822.80 and the medical school separately listed at \$1,418,548.01.

Car Clips Wagon Wheel Off During Skid on Highway

The 20th century clashed with the 19th century on the Pacific highway north of Eugene the other day, and the 19th century got a wheel knocked off.

The actual clash took place between representatives of the two centuries, the automobile and the wagon. Robert Holloway, Portland, driving a large car south, came up behind a wagon driven by G. R. Tolliver, going the same direction. According to the report filed in the sheriff's office, the car was making about 45 miles an hour.

Unable to pass the wagon on account of two other cars passing from the opposite direction, the driver of the car slowed down before reaching the wagon, and then speeded up to pass as a curve approached. Suddenly another car coming from the opposite direction appeared and passed the wagon.

The Holloway car was forced to slide in between the oncoming car as it passed and the wagon with the result that the car skidded as it passed the wagon, the rear end swung around and the rear bumper of the car nearly clipped off the rear wheel of the wagon.

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11 MEET DEATH IN SPECTACULAR FIRE

CLEVELAND, O., June 7.—(AP)—Eleven persons were known to be dead and twelve others were missing in an explosion and fire which swept a downtown apartment early today.

Four bodies had been brought out of the ruins and firemen had alighted four others. First Assistant Chief James Nimmo said he was positive two more bodies still were in the ruins.

Bodies of two men and two women had been recovered and Nimmo said six others probably were trapped and burned to death. Nimmo's estimate was based on a check of the number of residents with those accounted for. It would take hours, firemen said, to make a complete search of the debris.

About 30 more were burned or injured, while the rest of the nearly 200 residents were saved in dramatic escapes.
