and they couldn't tell how far they were from the surface of the ocean. Once the motor sputtered, hesitated. The plane dipped downward and they thought they were doomed—if they had time to think. But suddenly the motor commenced to fire regularly again. As they caught a fleeting glimpse of rolling waves a few feet below their plane, Alcock jerked open the throttle, moved the plane upward and with a vibrating roar it lifted out of danger.

They were in a fog nearly all the way. Sometimes they flew as low as 12,000 feet; at others they sailed on for miles only 300 feet above the sea.

At last their instruments indicated they were over Ireland. They circled the plane, and saw a hole in the clouds. They took that chance. He moved the biplane downward. It shot into clear air. A rough field lay below. But they must land and did.

The plane struck a hummock, bounced along, swerved down and struck on its nose with a shattering crash that jolted the two aviators forward. They crumpled out of the wreckage, shook themselves and discovered they were uninjured.

That was the first time man had ever crossed the Atlantic on a non-stop flight in an airplane. American news carried it. London gave them a tumultuous, wildly cheering celebration. Both were knighted.

Alcock's Fate
A week later in Normandy Alcock's plane crashed. He was alive when he was lifted out, but he died that fall of injuries and was buried in Surrey. Brown practically gave up flying and went to work for the electrical firm where he is now an executive.

Middle-aged and prosperous, he is now nearly forgotten by the millions in the international public which applauded him 15 years ago.

Certainly one of the best (and best liked) of all fliers, a quiet man, conducts a ground school in New York. He carried the first passenger across the sea. Do you place him? See tomorrow's Register-Guard for "Air Paths of Glory."

POWER DISTRICT FOR HOOD RIVER VALLEY PLANNED

SALEM, June 7.—(AP)—The state hydro-electric commission today announced its approval of the proposed Hood River people's utility district for the supply and distribution of electric energy in the entire Hood River valley, including 180 square miles.

C. E. Stricklin, secretary of the commission which has had the matter under consideration for some time, stated the commission "believes that if bonds can be sold at not less than par, bearing not to exceed 5 per cent interest, it would be financially feasible for the district to be created and to enter upon the purchase and distribution of electric energy."

This is the second hydro-electric district which has been before the commission since the law making the creation of utility district possible. The first one, that including Tillamook and vicinity, was declared satisfactory as far as creation of the district was concerned but the commission recommended against the development of hydro-electric energy.

The commission's engineers reported the best of the four proposed projects in the Hood River district would be the enlarging of the farmers' canal, which now diverts water for irrigation, so that it would carry sufficient water for power development. The engineers' report estimated cost of the 5400 horsepower generating plant would be \$336,430, or with distribution system and financing a total cost of about \$915,000.

The district is now served by the Pacific Power and Light company, and residents paid during 1931 an average price of 3.62 cents per kilowatt hour. Under the new plan as proposed the cost would be about 2.7 cents or a saving of about 10 per cent per kilowatt hour.

The commission further recommended that if it is possible, as the bonded limit of the district indicates, to finance the entire project, that some of the transmission lines be not constructed at once. Further recommendations include the acquisition of the Pacific Power and Light company facilities now serving the district, if obtainable at a fair price.

The hydro-electric commission consists of R. L. Edly, Roseburg, chairman; E. R. Sunde, Salem, and C. E. Stricklin, state engineer.

of democracy, denouncing parliamentary government as a failure. Even one of the leaders of the democratic party, uttering a view heard hitherto only among the mortal enemies of the democracy, remarked to the correspondents:

"Our post-war blunder was in administering an overdose of democracy to a people for centuries accustomed to absolutism."

While democracy is being eradicated, many are asking whether the republic will be the next victim. Standing near the Brandenburg gate, Otto Borenemann, member of the Reichstag, remarked:

"Maybe the crown prince will make a triumphal entry through that portal in the autumn."

Questioning of a dozen other members of the reichstag, however, brought the opinion that monarchism is no immediately acute problem, especially in view of the anti-monarchistic sentiment in southern Germany.

The topic of a monarchic restoration is less in the foreground than the measures being discussed by the cabinet for stamping out democracy and essentially re-creating the nation in the image of pre-war Germany.

A leading nationalist told the United Press if the government fails to obtain a majority in the reichstag which will be elected next month, the reichstag may be dissolved for four years and the dictatorship continued.

If the new parliament is allowed to survive, it was stated, its function may be merely that of a safety valve to enable critics of events to let off steam harmlessly. Von Papen counts on popular support for the policy of subjugating the reichstag, believing the public tired of parliamentary rule.

The government was considering also establishing later a sort of house of lords, which would further doom the reichstag to insignificance. Von Papen intends virtually to abolish the Prussian government of the last 13 years, which has been the backbone of German democracy. Recalling the system under which the kaiser was both emperor of Germany and king of Prussia, the Prussian administration, according to a project on which it was learned the cabinet was informally agreed, would be under the heel of Von Papen's regime.

To eliminate thus the dualism of the reich and Prussia, the government proposes to name a commission with dictatorial powers in Prussia. That would involve shelving the Prussian diet, and would extend the reich's authority over the armed forces to include 90,000 well-equipped and disciplined Prussian police.

Regarding social problems, the Von Papen government plans to put the relations between laborers and employers on a pre-war basis. The government would swiftly abolish the collective wage agreements which the labor unions forced the employers to accept after the war and which were regarded as one of the principal democratic achievements of the November 1918 revolution. Government arbitration of labor disputes also would be abandoned.

The first condition of the secret pact between Adolf Hitler and Kurt von Schleicher, of the new defense ministry, which proceeded the change of government, was fulfilled with dissolution of the reichstag. The second condition will be carried out soon when Von Papen transforms Hitler's brown militia into labor battalions in the government's service, its leaders consequently occupying government jobs.

Thus, without formally lifting the previous government's ban on the fascist militia, Von Papen will go further by absorbing them into the state's employ.

Chile's Socialist Head May Resign

SANTIAGO, Chile, June 7.—(AP)—Carlos Davila, head of Chile's three-day-old socialist government, may resign, it was reported today, because of army and navy dissatisfaction with his new regime. Civilian demonstrations, and quarreling among government leaders.

An important section of the army was not in sympathy with the new government. General Indalecio Veloso, Carlos Vargara, Montenegro, Carlos Saenz, and Manuel Otero applied for retirement.

The government ordered important changes in the naval command, naming Admiral Chapucon as chief of staff and giving Admiral Sporer eight hours to hand over command of the Valparaiso station to Admiral Luis Munoz.
