

GRADUATION TIME THEME FOR SERMON GIVEN SUNDAY HERE

In keeping with the period of commencement, Rev. Milton S. Weber, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church, preached on "Out of School and Out of a Job—What Shall I Do?" for his Sunday morning service. His text was Mt. 20:6, "Why stand ye here all the day idle?" His sermon in part follows:

"The answer to the question, 'What shall I do, is keep moving. There is no justifiable answer to the question of the text.

"Thousands of graduates of high schools, colleges and technical schools are just now asking themselves this question and it is well that certain considerations should be held very firmly in mind.

"First, there is no justification whatever for a man remaining idle. The story in Matthew's gospel tells of laborers who were standing idle in the market-place, which is the last place to be considered as conducive to idleness. So much goods changing hands, so much activity, articles offered and sold. Such a question may well be asked every person today. 'The young life of today is standing where all the cross currents of the universe collide. We cannot eat the bread of idleness. The fool foldeth his hands. Go to the ant, consider her ways and be wise.

"Second, no one will starve. Five hundred thousand people in the city of Chicago which city has been bankrupt since 1924 testify to the fact that while food is being produced men

will somehow secure food; and with God's sunshine and rain and fruitful soil the kindness of men will make sure to keep the hungry supplied with food. But if a man will not work neither shall he eat—2 Thes. 3:10.

Third, no one will be left without shelter. Again one must look to Chicago where rents have been unpaid, and city taxes uncollected for three years, where 150 school teachers are being cared for by charity and are able to carry on their work by the generosity of taxi drivers who help them to ride to school free. When the law allows landlords to evict those without means of paying rent, neighbors and friends quietly replace all the furniture in the house again. The state of Missouri's motto, 'The welfare of the people is the supreme law of the land.'

Fourth, no one will be disgraced in these readjustments, by his position in the economic scale because we are in the to-bogean and the direction is down; rather on the other hand, men are certain now that financial returns do not in even the simplest way indicate manliness or measure attainment. Rather he is disgraced who does not share with his brethren in these days.

Fifth, lastly no one need commit suicide, and thereby burden the memory of all his friends. So many others lacking all things still find life worth while, when idleness is removed, that only the utterly selfish and ignorant will take the easy way out. This completes the negative side of the question."
