

George "Wildcat" Pete To Meet Pat Reagan In Armory Match Friday

PAT WAITS MANY MONTHS FOR CRACK AT TITLE HOLDER

George "Wildcat" Pete, Eugene wrestler and holder of the world's junior middleweight championship, will meet Pat Reagan of Casper, Wyo., in the Eugene armory ring Friday evening. It will be the Wildcat's first appearance in several months and will also mark the comeback of Reagan who is in shape for the first time since he suffered a wrenched knee in his match with Young Hachenschmidt several months ago.



With the return of the Wildcat, wrestling promises to take an upward swing here. Pete has been on another of his trips through the east and though he posted the belt five times against eastern opponents, still remains champion.

Gives Reagan Chance
Herb Owen, promoter for the Eugene wrestling commission, has lined up the Pete-Reagan match in answer to Reagan's appeal for a crack at the champion. Reagan has been working out regularly of late and says he's ready to tackle anyone, including the world champion. Reagan was here for a match with Pete many months ago but the champion departed for the east without giving him his chance.

Walter "Sneeze" Achlu, oriental grappler, will get his crack at Pete very soon, Owen has promised.

The Wildcat was expected into Eugene Monday night or Tuesday morning, where he will work out this week in preparation for the match. Owen has not announced his special event.

Sports Parade

CHICAGO, June 13.—(U.P.)—Charles J. Hefey, big-spectacled outfielder of the St. Louis Cardinals, moved out of William H. Terry, New York Giant's first baseman, for last year's National league batting championship by a margin as slender as the silhouette of an adolescent eel.

When the final reckonings were complete, Hefey was winner with an average of .3489 against Terry's .3480. This difference was costly to Terry, robbing him of the glory of leading his league in hitting and what is more important, a strong talking point regarding his 1932 salary.

But did Terry ask for a recount? Did he take a leaf from the politician's handbook and demand a thorough going-over of the facts and figures? He did not. He took one look at the final standings and let it go. For ball players, as well as the hundreds of thousands of customers who follow the game, have come to accept statistics as the last word in accuracy and fairness.

Which is a roundabout way of announcing our subject for today—Mister Al Munro Elias, official statistician for the National, International, Eastern and a dozen or more minor leagues. Mister Elias and his gang deal with more figures in a month than the Indefatigable, Carroll and White in a lifetime. And to Mister Elias his dry and dusty figures are just as interesting and appealing as are their very sweet numbers to the showmen.

And baseball's figures are just as important to the game as the little

figures who run up and down the runway and pace across the stage, are to the musical comedy business. For those run after row of figures form the skeleton framework which supports baseball and gives it life.

Of course, Mister Elias does not do all the work alone, but it is he, and he alone, who checks and re-checks, counts and re-counts all the statistics put together by his staff.

For brother Elias is a trifle daffy on the subject of accuracy. When he says a left handed pitcher in the northwest Mississippi kerosene circuit by the name of Gus Guttenheimer, is hitting .1432, you may wonder Guttenheimer is knocking the old apple at just that figure.

"There are just two kinds of statistics," Al says. "Accurate statistics and worthless statistics. You might even go further than that and say that inaccurate figures are worse than worthless, for thousands of folks depend on them for information and are misled. If I could get my figures right, right, I would stake my life on 'em—I'd rather drive a laundry truck, which I understand, is very tricky work."

BABE RUTH AHEAD OF HIS RECORD; HELPS YANKS WIN

NEW YORK, June 13.—(U.P.)—Babe Ruth is blasting out home runs this season at the same merry clip that enabled him to establish an all-time record of 60 in 1927.

The Bamblino at Cleveland yesterday drove out homers No. 19 and 20, contributing to the New York Yankees' 13 to 5 victory over the Indians.

It was the Yanks' fifty-second game of the season. In 1927, the Babe made his 19th and 20 home runs in his team's 52nd game and against Cleveland.

Ahead of Record
Yesterday's four-baggers placed the big fellow eight circuit drives ahead of his number for 52 games last year. Babe has been at bat 188 times this season, made 57 hits, 48 runs and drove in 59 runs.

Yesterday's blows placed him only two home runs behind Jimmy Fox of the Philadelphia Athletics, who leads both leagues.

Detroit replaced Cleveland in fourth place in the American league by defeating the Philadelphia Athletics, 8 to 6. Jimmy Fox bagged his 22nd home run.

He has one more year of high school competition and will be seen in the backfield on Fritz Kramer's football team this fall.

Dick started playing baseball for Franklin high school in Portland, and played with the Gryo Cardinals, Legion junior team of Portland that won the western championship and reached the semi-finals in the national tournament. METCALFE HAILED AS SPRINT FIND

CHICAGO, June 13.—(U.P.)—Ralph Metcalfe, Marquette negro sophomore, today was hailed in midwest track and field circles as the greatest all-around sprinter since Charley Paddock was in his prime a dozen years ago.

Breaking three world's records and equalling another in one afternoon in the National Collegiate A. A. meet at Stagg Field, Saturday, Metcalfe accomplished more than any other sprinter since Paddock.

Here's what Metcalfe did: 100 yards—39.5, equalling accepted world's record, 100 meters—10.2, two-tenths of a second faster than the world's record made by Paddock in 1921.

220 yards—20.5, one-tenth of a second faster than Roland Locke's world record made in 1923.

200 meters—20.3, three-tenths of a second under Locke's world record.

Metcalfe has never run the 100 yards in .39.4 as have Frank Wykoff, Southern California, and George Simpson, Ohio State, but he has three times this season run it in .39.5 and he hasn't been pushed yet at that distance.

Eugene wanted no time in getting to Lefty Woodward, and in the first inning Stevens led off with a double. Chapline King followed with a single, a perfect bunt down third, sending Stevens to third. Van Dusen struck out and Gould walked, filling the bases. Libby singled, scoring Stevens and on a double steal, King scored while Gould and Libby advanced. Husband then tripled to right field, scoring Gould and Libby. Libby and Husband scored on a single by Russell. Bishop and Bloom ended the inning, both flying out.

Albany came right back in their half and scored three runs on two singles, a walk and a double by Joie Mack. Eugene scored one more in the fourth on a single by Bloom, a walk to Stevens and a double by Van Dusen. Two more runs came in the fifth on two walks, an error, and singles by Russell and Bloom.

Albany's fireworks started in the fifth and spelled the retirement of Dave Bloom from the mound. Dowling led off with a long home run over center field. Hecker doubled. Mack tied out, but two more doubles by McReynolds and Steelhammer sent Bloom to the showers. Young Bob Wiltshire went in to pitch for Eugene and retired the side, striking out the hard hitting Wilkinson.
