

# Local Markets Steady; Stock Market Slumps

## HAY CUTTING WELL UNDERWAY; PRICES NOT GIVEN AS YET

Hay cutting is getting generally underway in this section, although the farmers are just starting on their oats and vetch. There is a huge quantity of hay in the Eugene vicinity this year, double last year's crop, one dealer reported Tuesday.

Little hay has been brought in for market yet with result no prices have been announced. The first is looked to bring around \$7 or \$8 a ton, however, although the price is not certain. Prices generally will be considerably below last year's, it is said.

All produce, eggs, poultry, butter, and buttermilk, continued unchanged, very few cherries are coming in as yet, mainly the early sweet ones, and the little pie cherries. Prices range around 3 and 4 cents a pound, buying price.

Strawberries are not as plentiful as they have been but are plentiful enough for the demand. Prices continue from 40 up to 65 cents a crate, buying price.

Asparagus is practically gone. Some are still selling that has been in cold storage.

Green peas are coming in much more plentifully, listed still at 3c a pound, buying price. Some are quoted down to 2 1/2 cents.

Red raspberries are still listed at \$1.00 a crate of 20 boxes, buying price.

### BUTTER STEADY ON PORTLAND MARKET

There remains a generally steady tone in the local butter trade and without quotation change for either tubs or prints. Make it still decreasing but general wants for either cubes or prints. Make it still decreasing but general wants of the trade are being taken care of.

Late advance of 1c in the selling price on eggs is being generally maintained here with receipts still showing

ing an almost general decrease. Movement into storage continues on a liberal scale.

Expressing full sympathy with the late advance in the price of live hogs, market for country killed stock is firmer and higher. It has been rather active for some time past.

Somewhat better feeling is also expressed in the market for country killed veal and lamb. It is the first improvement in the latter for some time past but extreme quotations in both lines are on a nominal basis.

All through the market for tomatoes offerings are reflected for the day. Breakings of all sorts are in greater and the trade's full wants are more than taken care of. Hothouse movement now at the peak.

Owing to the forced maturity as a result of a shortage of water, the Peas are being marketed at a low price. Several carloads are on the track here. Prices are ranging mostly around \$1.15 per 50-lb. bag.

Surprising increase in local demand for extra quality offered from Milwaukee and the laible sections. Prices are held firm at the late advances.

Cherry market is overdone with greater and low prices are sent still lower.

Strawberry market is steady as is the raspberry position.

Offerings on currants are liberal with prices continuing to decline. Cantaloupes and watermelons are reported steady.

California apricots are in huge offering with low prices very weak. Green beans in more liberal supply and about 1c lb. again.

Cauliflower market is very slow, mostly \$1.15 a crate for firm.

Head lettuce is firm with the late advance maintained.

Asparagus maintains its recent strong demand and price.

East Side Market

It was a very slow trading session Tuesday on the East Side Farmers' wholesale market. Lack of snap in buying was noted in practically all offerings.

Hothouse tomatoes showed a sharp lower price list with liberally increased supplies. Sales were mostly \$2.50 for extra fancy and \$2 for fancy 20s.

Dalles outdoor tomatoes were in small supply and nominally \$2.50 box. Strawberries were very slow moving with the bulk of the fruit selling 50-55c but trading was shown at a spread of 35-45c. Gold Dollars moved mostly at half dollar.

Raspberries were extremely slow at \$1.50-1.75 a crate for Evergreen and \$1.75-2.00 nominally for Cutbert.

Loganberries, while in very small supply, are in a limited way at \$1.25-1.50 a crate.

Currants were slower with only small supplies. Sales \$1-1.25 a crate, with some mostly 3c lb.; a few 2 1/2c.

Green beans were around 6c lb. generally.

Lettuce sold 75c-\$1 crate generally. Cabbage was \$1 for best and 70c for extra.

Cauliflower held practically without change.

Crooked neck squash was mostly \$1 flat crate as was summer stock. Asparagus was around \$1.35-1.40 a bushel.

Local turnips sold 30c dozen bunches. Other root vegetables unchanged.

Rhubarb was mostly 50c apple box.

### Game Commission To Work on Sandy

PORTLAND, Ore., June 21.—(P)—Expenditure of \$7500 to begin work on the Sandy river dam, the Game Commission is authorized to build the dam, for strictly combing staple and around 34c for French combing.

The principal work to be done is the construction of a dam to divert the water of the Sandy channel into the Little Sandy, thus forming a direct outlet into the Columbia river and creating sufficient current to wash away the sand that has collected and which has acted as an obstruction to the fish. The commission voted to obtain an option for the immediate purchase of the necessary land, subject to securing a permit from the federal government to build the dam. C. F. Swigert, owner of the acreage, has offered to sell for \$5000.

Harvey Moreland, clerk, told the game commission receipts from bunting and fishing licenses were below expectations. He said he estimated the total receipts for the year would be 10 to 15 per cent below normal.

### Filipino Is Freed Of Murder Charge

ASTORIA, Ore., June 21.—(P)—Sasino Aquino, Filipino charged with the knife slaying of Ferguson Baltazar, Astoria cannery worker, was acquitted by a jury in circuit court here today.

Aquino was fatally stabbed last April following what police described as a drunken brawl involving three white women and six Filipinos.
