More than 300 persons attended the third annual homecoming celebration of the Santa Clara community Sunday. The event was staged in the community hall, a basket dinner being served at 1 o'clock and the program being given at 2 o'clock.

All officers were re-elected to stage the 1933 reunion. They are Mrs. George Robinson, president; H. A. Sims, vice-president; Mrs. Clinton D. Chesebrough, secretary-treasurer.

Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Potter represented one of the earliest families in the community, while "Grandpa" Harris, who makes his home with his daughter, Mrs. H. R. Emerson, was the oldest person present. Among others of the early families at the gathering were Mrs. J. R. Barbee, Mrs. William Kerr, Mrs. J. L. Luckey, E. M. Johnson, chairman of the school board, gave the address of welcome, and Mrs. William Forrester gave the response. Rev. Walter L. Juries sustained in answering calls from outside the city limits. Such work is not considered as official duty as long as residents living beyond the city limits have made no provision for fire protection by the city and do not contribute to the support of the department, the commission held.

Residents of the communities beyond the city limits have located their homes there so as to escape paying the costs of maintaining the protection services and can not expect to be accorded the protection. It was said during discussion in the council. The refusal of compensation for accidents in connection with outside fires would place the city in danger of suit as a result of accidents occurring within the city while the department was answering a call from beyond the boundaries, it was stated.

The proposed card room ordinance would make easier the supervision of card and pool rooms by the police who would be able to see what games were being conducted at all times. The conduct of any such games, whether gambling were being permitted or not, would be cause for the arrest of the owners or manager of a resort.

A protest against the city meat inspection fees was lodged with the council by Mr. Brennan and Mr. Knox, claiming the fees to be exorbitant in view of present prices paid the producer. The matter was referred to the health committee.

The use of \$1000 of sinking fund money was approved for the purchase of Eugene city bonds from Freeman, Camp and Riley at \$98 per \$100 face value.

A request that Thirteenth and High be made a stop street was referred to the police committee for investigation. The question of forcing cutting tall grass on vacant lots was referred to the chief of police, as was the question of menaces to public safety and welfare in several old barns about the city.

The council voted that the city milk inspector be allowed \$15 a month toward expenses of operating his own automobile on city business.

The council approved a settlement of \$500 general damages and costs of \$88.20 in the suit of Carter vs. the city of Eugene. Mrs. Carter alleging injuries received in a fall caused by a broken sidewalk.

The city engineer was instructed to consult the Eugene hospital management relative to oiling the area between the hospital and the city hall.

An appropriation of \$8 was voted for advertising in the program for the state meeting of Veterans of Foreign Wars to be held in Eugene the latter part of July.

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Gas Price Up to 21 1/2 Cents Gallon

Gasoline was up to 21 1/2 cents a gallon, retail, at all major stations Tuesday. Two of the big companies raised the price Monday noon and the others followed suit shortly after noon.

The new price includes five cents tax—one cent being the new federal tax and the other four being the regular Oregon state tax.
