this project after which the road will be oiled and only maintenance necessary to keep an excellent road across the McKenzie pass.

Rocking of the Willamette highway will be completed this year, but it is not likely the oil will be put on since rocking is expected to take most of this summer. A contract for rocking of the last eight miles into Oakridge is yet to be let, but will probably be awarded soon.

Since oiling will probably not be started till the entire road is rocked, it is thought that the work will have to wait till next season.

In the coast area, considerable progress is reported on various road projects, according to Commissioner Hurd. Crews at work moving the Southern Pacific tracks have completed their work this side of Mapleton and are moving below Mapleton where there is about three and one-half miles of track to be moved to

make way for the new Siuslaw highway.

It has been hoped to have this new road ready for traffic this year, but the late season, coupled with the fact that bids on the work have been held up due to the late appropriation for the work on the part of the government, had held up the work and it is now expected that the road will be open only as far as Beck this year.

Graveling of the Canby cutoff will be started Tuesday, the county planning to ship six carloads of gravel from here every other day. Work on the Mercer Lake fill is being completed and men are starting to put in the fills on the Mercer Lake outlet bridge.

On the North Fork project about one mile remains to be graveled to complete this job. Work will be finished here by July 9, Hurd reported.

The Deadwood bridge has been completed and the painting is nearly finished. Men will start work on the bridge fill this fall.

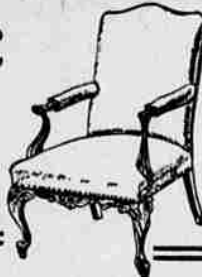

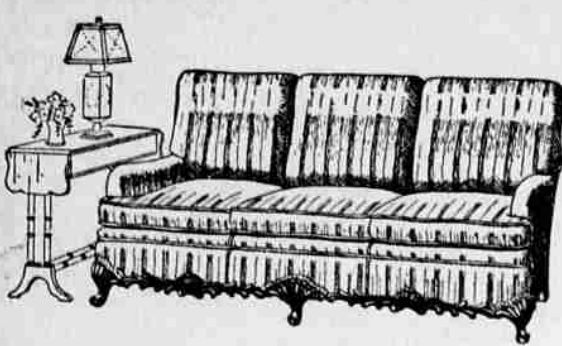

cal speeches, were almost in hysterics as Rogers shot his kindly humor through the petty pretenses of the politicians.

"The platform," Rogers said, "will be adopted this week and forgotten next week."

He said he was going to be the first speaker with a good word to say for the opposition.

"But it's going to take me a long time to think of something," he said. "The republicans did the best they could with what little they had."

"I don't know who we are going to nominate here. I like all the candidates. I hate to see these conventions, because someone has to lose. I wish we could nominate them in some way so they'd all have a week apiece."

He mentioned Roosevelt first.

The crowd cheered.

"Don't mind the parade," Rogers said.

Referring to Huey Long, he said the "Old Louisiana Porcupine" had put up a good talk yesterday.

"Al Smith, I love," he said while the Smith delegates applauded.

Speaker Garner he described as a "Texas prairie dog whose home he had visited and whom he liked."

"There's Ritchie," he said, "a big man from a little state."

"Ritchie always has been a stickler for state rights. You can wake him up at any time of the night and he'll start right in on state rights."

"They're all good. You can't do wrong on any of them."

John Krouton of Yukon, Okla., came before the platform and waved

an Oklahoma banner.

"Oh, yes, there's Bill Murray," Rogers said.

Rogers pleaded for the delegates to act harmoniously and "don't go home sore," he said.

"I don't see how there could be a weak enough man not to win next November if he'll live that long."

He pleaded with the delegates not to describe any candidate as the "weakest candidate."

"Let's nominate Rogers," someone shouted.

"For the Lord's sake don't act like democrats," Rogers pleaded seriously, "act like he was the one you wanted."

Rogers commented that he wasn't the only comedian who had been on the platform and asked the democrats not to make fools of themselves.

"We've always had fun with our conventions," he said, "because we weren't going anywhere. But don't vote too much this time. Don't take the platform seriously. It ain't never going to be read any more, anyway."

THEY HAVE CAREER AND HOME BESIDES

SALEM, Ore., June 29.—Ore-

gon women apparently know how to simultaneously conduct the duties of home and a "career."

Out of the 240,401 family homemakers in Oregon reported during the last census, 16.1 per cent pursued a gainful occupation in addition to their home-making activities, said a federal report.

Of the 38,700 who worked for money as well as for husband and children, 4,279 carried on the added

load at occupations conducted in the home.

Among the 31,393 who were employed away from the family hearth were included 9,053 professional workers, 9,000 office workers, 4,500 waitresses, and 3,320 saleswomen.

A homemaker was defined as that responsible for the care of home and family. Those considered as employed followed a gainful occupation of the native white homemaker.

16.7 per cent were gainfully employed, the government census takers reported. Of the foreign-born white, 18.2 per cent had positions that paid real money, and of negroes, 30.5 per cent.
