

NATIONAL OFFICIAL OF ATHLETIC GROUP TO LECTURE HERE

Miss Anne Frances Hodgkins, national secretary of the Woman's Division of the National Amateur Athletic Federation, will be in Eugene today, June 30, to address the assembly of the summer session of the University of Oregon. It was announced today by Dr. Dan E. Clark, director for the Eugene campus. Miss Hodgkins will speak at 11 o'clock in Villard hall on the details and work of the organization she represents.

The woman's division of the National Amateur Athletic Federation was established in 1923 by Mrs. Herbert Hoover and 200 prominent educators who felt the need for a group which would establish standards for girls' athletics and prevent them from becoming commercialized and professionalized. Hundreds of educational and recreational organizations are now on the federation's roster.

The federation aims to promote programs of athletics for all girls which are fitted to their strength and interest rather than developing a few star performers. Miss Hodgkins says. Throughout the activity of its members the federation has been largely responsible for the growth of interest in intramural athletics for girls.

Mrs. Hoover is the honorary chairman of the woman's division and Mrs. Jane Deeter Rippin, for many years national director of the Girls' Sports of America, is chairman.

Mrs. Hodgkins was for eight years director of recreation for the Eaton company of Toronto where 8,000 women are employed. In her capacity as field secretary she has visited every state in the union and has studied many phases of girls' athletics and physical education. The assembly will be open to all interested.

MANY RECIPES FOR CHERRIES AVAILABLE

Modern housewives have a wide variety of ways to choose from in canning cherries. Here are a few recipes from the many available at the office of Miss Gertrude Shaw, home demonstration agent:

- Cherry Olives**
Fill jar with large cherries, leaving stems and pack fruit in jars as closely as possible.
Mix together 1 tablespoon salt and 1 cup vinegar for each quart, pour mixture over into jar of cherries. Fill each jar with cold water. Seal. Allow cherries to stand two weeks. These cherries are not heated and make a firm salt pickle to be used with meats.
- Pickled Cherries**
Wash and seed cherries—drain thoroughly in colander. Place in earthen jar—cover with vinegar. Let stand 12 hours. Measure cherries and add an equal amount of sugar. Let stand for 10 days, stirring each morning. Remove cherries to hot jars and seal.
- Cherry Conserve**
2 lbs. Royal Ann cherries
2 lbs. sugar
1 orange
1-2 lemons
Wash and remove seeds from fruit. Put all through food chopper. Put on stove when boiled add sugar. Boil until thick and jelly like substance. Pour in jars and seal.
- Red Raspberry and Cherry Conserve**
1 cup cherries
1 cup red raspberries
1-2 cups sugar.
Cook cherries in a small amount of water until skins are tender. Add raspberries and sugar until mixture is thick and clear. Pack in hot jars. Seal at once.
- Maraschino Cherries**
5 lbs. cherries
5 lbs. sugar
1 oz. red fruit coloring
1 oz. almond extract
Boil until thick. Pack in hot jars.

Any kind of cherries. Pie cherries are clearest.

Diamond Peak to Be Climbed July 4

All those planning to make the climb are urged to sign up at the McMorran and Washburne shoe department.

As the mountain has a living glacier, this trip will be a qualifying trip for prospective members. It was announced. Climbers should be equipped with sleeping bags, sun glasses and warm clothing.
