

GERMANY REFUSES TO PUT UP BOND WITH WORLD BANK

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, June 20.—(AP)—Germany refused today to agree to a suggestion by France that she deposit a 6,000,000,000 mark bond with the world bank in lieu of reparations annuities, pending negotiation of revised debt agreements with the United States.

Baron Konstantin von Neurath, the German foreign minister, communicated the negative reply to Prime Minister MacDonald of Great Britain after having consulted with the rest of the German delegation and his cabinet colleagues in Berlin.

A safeguard clause, avoided here before because it was distasteful to Washington, was embodied in a

French compromise plan at the reparations conference today.

The French proposed that Germany deposit with the world bank a bond of 60,000,000,000 marks, approximately \$1,500,000,000.

One-third of the amount would be Germany's contribution to a general fund for the economic reconstruction of Europe. The remainder would be set aside pending negotiation of revised debt agreements with the United States.

Under the safeguard clause Germany would still be held liable for reparations in the event the United States refused to reduce the debts owed her by the world war allies.

Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain pleaded with the Germans to accept the proposal, assuring them they need have no fear with regard to American generosity.
