PORTLAND, Ore., July 1.—(AP)—John Armstrong, 50, was burned seriously and two others were overcome by smoke in a rooming house fire here early today.

Firemen found Armstrong lying unconscious in a hallway. He suffered first degree burns to his hands, arms, face, neck and back.

The two who were overcome by smoke recovered rapidly. Another man suffered from shock and another became confused and had to be carried to safety.

Origin of the fire was not determined. Fire investigators estimated the damage at about \$2000.

him of the full amount provided by statute.
The attorney-general ruled Hoss had no right to make refunds on licenses already paid except where paid by error or where the car was destroyed before half the license period had expired.
After reading the lengthy opinion Hoss was still of the opinion that he would put into effect a plan to issue colored stickers in lieu of a license, each to serve for one-quarter of the year.

Wants Burden Relieved
"I am anxious to assist in relieving the financial burdens of the motor vehicle owner," Hoss declared, "and I will do everything possible to devise some plan whereby licenses may be obtained without loss to the state or inconvenience and embarrassment to the applicants."

Meanwhile Governor Meier, in a statement issued in Portland, had berated Hoss for his part in the auto license jumble and had accused him of bad faith in releasing confidential information to the public. Hoss had no statement to make other than to declare he might issue a reply later in the week.

DOBBIE PRAISES EUGENE, U. OF O.

"The most beautiful city on the coast, and the most hospitable." Those were the words of Capt. Hugh Barrett Dobbs, known to millions of radio listeners as Capt. Dobbsie. They were echoed by his troupe of radio entertainers which included Carrie Jacobs Bond, internationally famous composer.

Dobbsie and his Shell Happytime crowd were presented over the coast network of the Columbia system from the stage of the Fox McDonald here Friday morning. The theater was "jammed to the rafters," and the crowd flowed out onto the street where radio sets carried the program to those who could not get in.

The Eugene Gleemen, fresh from their Seattle triumphs, were also presented over the Columbia network as a part of the half-hour program. Capt. Dobbsie had visited the Gleemen at their rehearsal Thursday evening and invited them to take part.

Dobbsie had nothing but praise for Eugene and the University of Oregon and he described this as the ideal educational setting. Mrs. Bond also spoke and presented several of her own compositions, including "I Love You Truly," one of her greatest favorites.

The Happytime troupe was widely entertained here by the chamber of commerce, junior chamber of commerce, Gleemen and other organizations. They left for Medford where another coast broadcast will also be presented.

CHANCE FOR LEGAL BEER NOW SLIGHT

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(AP)—Congressional leaders today declared there was "not a chance" of legalizing beer before this congress adjourns. Jubilant wets nevertheless went ahead with plans for concerted action as soon as the democratic convention is concluded. They claimed the convention landslide for repeal and for immediate modification would switch enough votes to legalize beer at this session.

Moderates in both houses pointed to the rush of last-minute legislation on the calendar and the desire for adjournment as soon as possible. They said modification would not receive proper consideration if attempted at this time.

Senator Norris, repn. Neb., veteran dry, who said two days ago he had "terribly disappointed" in dry enforcement, argues that modification is as much of an experiment as prohibition and should be attacked only after careful study.

Although Prohibition Director Woodcock intends to pursue enforcement activities with no softening because of the move toward repeal, it will be necessary for him to cut his forces, in the interests of economy, by 65 to 70 agents.

ACQUITTAL MOTION IS DENIED CURTIS

FLEMINGTON, N. J., July 1.—(AP)—A defense motion for a directed verdict of acquittal in the trial of John Hughes Curtis for hindering capture of the kidnappers of the Lindbergh baby was denied today.

"Here's another lie. Why don't you tell the truth?"

"The colonel turned then and walked from the room in a disgusted manner," it was testified by Inspector Harry Walsh at Curtis' trial for his dereliction of duty in the kidnapping case.

A few minutes later Curtis was feverishly trying to get his confession that all his negotiations had been the imaginings of a distorted mind.

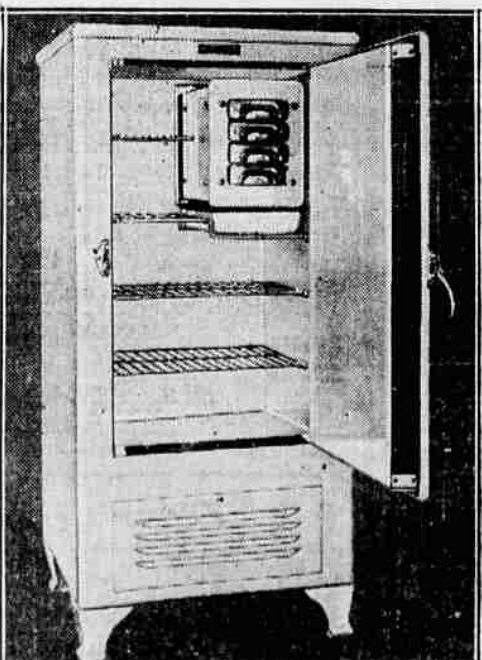
