

JUNE DRY MONTH, WITH LESS THAN HALF INCH RAIN

A dry June followed an unusually wet May, the monthly report from the local weather office shows. There was only .54 of an inch of precipitation here last month as against 2.53 inches in June, 1931.

It was a comparatively warm month in June, too, with the maximum mounting to 90 once, June 10. The minimum reached 43 several times during the month, the highest in the lowest minimums recorded for the month during the past nine years. Last year the maximum went to 91 in June, but the minimum dropped to 40. In the preceding year, 1930, the maximum mounted to 92, but the minimum was lower at 38, for the extreme temperatures during the month.

There were 16 clear days, 13 partly cloudy days, and one cloudy day during the month.

The chart on highest maximum and lowest minimum temperatures during June for the past nine years is as follows: 1932, 90 and 43; 1931, 91 and 40; 1930, 92 and 38; 1929, 90 and 37; 1928, 88 and 41; 1927, 89 and 39; 1926, 90 and 42; 1925, 100 and 41; 1924, 98 and 41; 1923, 90 and 39.

The precipitation chart for the past nine years reads as follows: 1932, .54 of an inch; 1931, 2.53 inches; 1930, 1.02 inches; 1929, 3.55 inches; 1928, .18 of an inch; 1927, 1.52 inches; 1926, .23 of an inch; 1925, .87 of an inch; 1924, .30 of an inch; 1923, 1.90 inches.

The Willamette river was 2.5 feet for its highest stage in June and at 1.1 of a foot for the lowest stage.

For the past nine years the river has been recorded as follows for highest and lowest stages during June: 1932, 2.5 and 1.1; 1931, 2.1 and 1.1; 1930, 2.1 and 1.1; 1929, 2.4 and 1.1; 1928, 2.4 and 1.1; 1927, 2.4 and 1.1; 1926, 2.4 and 1.1; 1925, 2.4 and 1.1; 1924, 2.4 and 1.1; 1923, 2.4 and 1.1.

BONUS ARMY PUT THROUGH SEVERE DRILL BY LEADER

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(U.P.)—Soldiers of the bonus expeditionary force lined up immediately after breakfast today and went through a stiff bonus drill under a hot sun.

Sharp commands of "squad right" and "double time—March" attested the strict discipline clamped down by Walter W. Waters, forceful young commander-in-chief, elected Wednesday and given dictatorial powers.

Waters is determined to make a brisk military unit of the 15,000 veterans who had become little else but squatters since the senate's defeat of the bonus bill.

At the same time Waters was making plans to extend the B. E. F. throughout the United States. If his plan succeeds other cities may harbor bonus armies similar to the one here. Waters proposes to send veterans

schooled by underfire experience at the Washington front to various localities to organize drill units. These would remain stationed where formed, providing an ever-present illustration of the plight of unemployed veterans. Their presence would be their plea.

"The bonus, of course, is the main idea," Waters explained, "but we feel that such solidification will be the first step toward the relief of all unemployment."

"No reactionary groups will be tolerated and these corps would stand ready to aid in the enforcement of law and order."

\$807,026.77 Is Collected By Lane

Lane county had collected \$807,026.77 in taxes at the close of accounts on June 30, it was revealed here Friday by County Treasurer Grace Schiska.

This figure represents first half 1931 taxes collected by the tax department as well as several thousand dollars in back taxes. It represents approximately 80 per cent of the tax money needed according to the budget for the first half of the year.

A total of \$1,010,196.69 was due as first half of the 1931 levy this year. Actual collections of first half 1931 taxes were but \$657,308.45. The levy for the entire year is \$2,020,393.38.
