

POLICE ALARMED IN KIDNAP CASE

CROOKSTON, Minn., July 6.—(AP)—A man arrested here confessed today, a deputy sheriff said, to complicity in the disappearance in St. Paul last Thursday of Haskell Bohn, 20, member of a wealthy family.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 6.—(AP)—Six days had passed today and Haskell Bohn, 20, son of the millionaire refrigerator manufacturer, was still in the hands of abductors holding him for \$35,000 ransom.

Police were admittedly worried over progress of negotiations for the youth's release, pointing out that in the majority of kidnap cases the victim's release is obtained after three or four days.

Authorities moved to take a more active part in the affair after having held off at the request of Gebhart C. Bohn, the youth's father, to allow freedom of negotiation. The elder Bohn announced publicly that he was willing to pay for his son's freedom.

Three men seized young Bohn last Thursday as he was about to enter his automobile. They thrust into the hands of the Bohn chauffeur a note demanding \$35,000 ransom and warning of a repetition of the Lindbergh tragedy if their demands were not met.

Since that time several communications have been received from the gang including it was believed telephone calls. One was a letter from young Bohn to his father pleading that he pay the money.

Police believed the kidnappers were educated and fully familiar with Bohn's movements from various references in their letters. The original demand was couched in excellent English and used several of the words unusual to an underworld character.

Grove Men Suffer Accidents July 4

Harry W. Neet was the most severely injured. His right hand was badly scalded when it was struck by boiling water from the radiator of his car when he removed the cap to put water in the radiator.

J. E. Young suffered a severe gash in the flesh at the base of his right thumb while fishing. He was trying to keep dry while angling at the forks of Prayther and Champion creeks and was using a pole to balance himself while stepping from one rock to another.

He slipped and a knot on the pole gouged his hand, inflicting an ugly wound. He was fishing alone and had to return to camp to have the injury dressed.

Lee Spangberg suffered a fracture of the upper bone of the second finger of his right hand when he fell while carrying a tire rim at the Cottage Grove Motor company's garage. The finger was caught between the rim and the concrete floor. He slipped on an incline between the garage and salesroom.

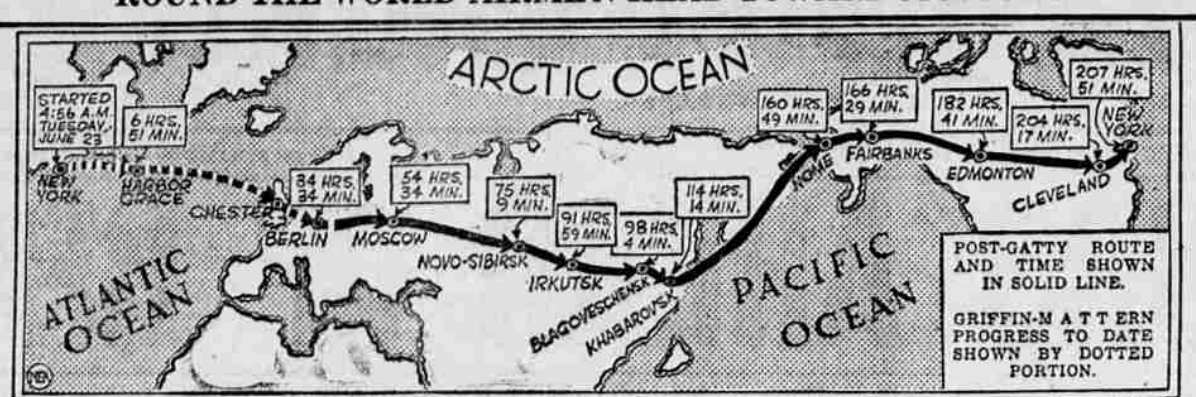

refusing to lend money for the restoration of industry or development. Urging the house to stick by its principle of broadening the base of the reconstruction corporation and not to surrender on the direct relief proposition, Garner said:

"I make that suggestion because I believe we have got to have some reservoir of relief or we will have riots. We might as well be plain about it."

"My desire is to have this legislation serve all the people of the United States and if congress does not accept it, I am willing to go before the country for the whole people while President Hoover goes before them for his 'selected clients.'"

Garner said he believed the congress might accept the president's suggestions on all but that section of the bill dealing with the Reconstruction Finance corporation loans.

When Garner sat down amid democratic cheers, Representative Snell, republican leader, took the floor.

Snell termed Garner's address "the acceptance speech of the democratic candidate for the vice-presidency."

"The gentleman from Texas," Snell said, "has made the greatest appeal for class distinction I have ever heard. His appeal was the greatest demagogic speech made on the floor of this house during this session."

A shout of "Remember November" rang down from the galleries and halted Snell just as he made this charge.

"To my mind, the president is entitled to praise for calling the conference down there," (at the White House), Snell continued. "The gentleman from Texas says this is an issue between the president and congress. It is not an issue between the president and congress but between the president and the democratic vice-presidential nominee."

"If it had not been for the gentleman from Texas we would have reached an agreement last night," Snell said.

HECTOR ON JOB

ALBANY, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—Far into the night circulators headed by Hector Macpherson, Linn county legislator, solicited signatures to the higher educational consolidation petitions to replace petitions said to have been stolen at Portland last Monday night. Macpherson expressed hope, rather than belief, that the 10,000 more or less names now needed might be secured before Thursday.

SOLUTION HERE? OREGON CITY, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—An amendment to the initiative petition law which would make impossible the theft of certified petitions will be used on the 1933 legislature by Donald J. Ryan, county clerk of Clackamas county. Ryan told the United Press today.

Ryan will propose that the law be amended so that county clerks will retain all petitions, and will transport them to the secretary of state, instead of returning them to their sponsors, as under the present machinery of the law.

"Under that system," Ryan said, "as soon as there are sufficient signatures filed, the secretary of state could so inform the sponsors and petition circulation would cease."

"Also, if the county clerks keep the petitions and transmit them to the secretary of state direct, we would have any more of these safe robberies."

that city is a matter of less than an hour and when they did not appear at Tempelhof within that time, those who awaited them at the field, including United States Ambassador Sackett, began to worry.

It developed, however, that there was some bad weather between here and Hanover and the globe girdlers had been obliged to go out of their way.

The Mattern-Griffin ship was the first flown by Americans to reach Berlin on a nonstop flight from the western hemisphere, and officials at Tempelhof airport took note of the extraordinary occasion by raising the Stars and Stripes as the "Century of Progress" taxied across the field.

U. S. Anthem Played A band played the Star Spangled Banner.

The crowd on hand was not very large because the time of the landing generally was unknown and an intermediate stop had been expected.

Ambassador Frederick M. Sackett, who had come to the field when informed the fliers had been sighted at Hanover, had left 15 minutes before the landing.

Mattern said they would take off again for Moscow before night unless the weather made it inadvisable.

Not a Bit Tired "Tired?" he said. "Not a bit. We've got double controls and we stood regular watches. While he was working Griffin slept, and when he took over, I curled up."

"It was 10 hours and 50 minutes on the dot after we left Harbor Grace that we sighted land. We kept on and from there I guess that was Ireland—we got to Berlin in 17 hours, 40 minutes flying time altogether."

"We'd have got here sooner, oh, hours sooner, but we missed the town and veered off to the north. Griffin spotted the name on a little railroad station and we turned around and came south again."

Fly Blind Over Sea "For all we saw there might not have been any ocean at all. We were flying blind in fog and believe it or not, our altitude ran from 6 inches to 10,000 feet."

"Well, we went south to Scotland and then we hit the North sea. Just where we struck the continent of Europe, I don't know."

German pilots on the field were jubilant when the American plane came down. Several ran out to where it rolled to a stop and thrust foaming scumles of beer at the fliers. To their amazement the Americans waved it ask.

Ask for Agua Pura "What we want," said Griffin, "is a good long drink of water. That beer looks good but it might not set so well. We haven't had anything but orange since we left New York."

But they both looked fine behind their wide grins as the welcome became a small ovation.
