

CALIFORNIA CHIEF EXECUTIVE NAMES CROPS DISPENSER

SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 7.—(AP)—Declaring an emergency to exist as a result of over-production of many farm crops, Governor Rolph today appointed Dudley Moulton director of agriculture, to the position of state food administrator, with full power to distribute these surplus crops to relief agencies all over the country.

Moulton said he would immediately contact the canning peach growers of the Tuhe-Sutter belt, who are permitting hundreds of tons of peaches to drop and rot on the ground. Much of this crop may be salvaged, he said.

Other producers of oranges, grapes, prunes, rice, wheat, beans and barley will be notified of the plan, and arrangements made to take up their surplus as rapidly as possible.

"We are face to face with a grave situation," said the governor. "On one hand, there is a large over-abundance of many of California's farm products for which there now appears to be no market. On the other hand, there are millions of persons—men, women and children, in every city and town of the United States, who are going hungry day after day.

"In the midst of this plenty on the fertile farm lands of this state, there is untold suffering both at home and abroad. California, I believe, can and will lead the way. I am convinced that by working largely through relief agencies we will be able to get the grower some return for these commodities which otherwise would go to waste, and at the same time we will be aiding the nation that California is embracing upon a program which we confidently believe will play an important part in national welfare work."

REFUSES TO DON
UNIFORM, JAILED

LILLE, France, July 7.—(AP)—Despite the Kellogg-Briand anti-war pact, Napoleon's maxim, "The rule of law ends where that of conscience begins," and the Bible proclamation of "Thou shalt not kill," a 35-year-old French teacher here, was declared guilty of disobedience because he refused to wear a soldier's uniform for conscientious and religious convictions.

His plea that the governments of the world had banned war failed to save him from four months in jail following his refusal to wear the uniform of the 15th Artillery Camp at Solasans last March. He was eloquently defended by his counsel, clergymen, physicians and civilians, and his case was adjourned with extenuating circumstances.

The case was considered as not uncommon in France, and his invocation of the peace pact and the biblical interdiction were offered as a challenge to the military service law. The court, by a majority of seven, however, declared Rombaud guilty of disobedience and re-sentenced him to four months in jail.

County Cannot Put Question on Ballot

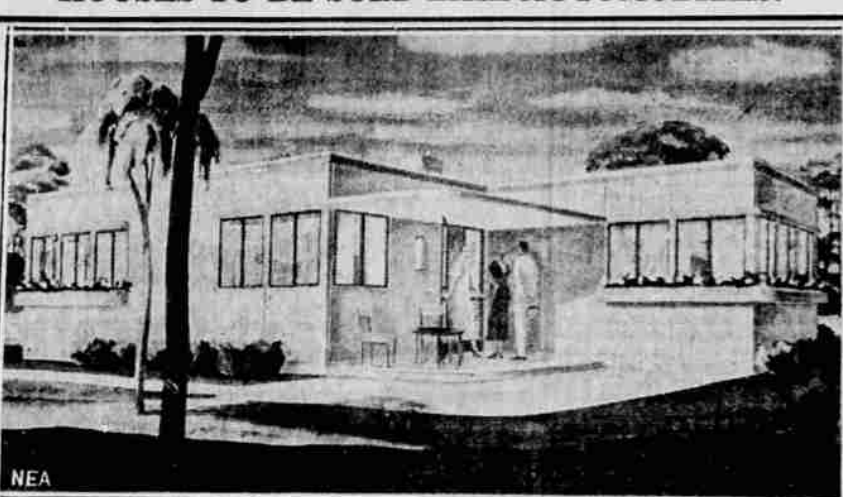

HOUSES TO BE SOLD LIKE AUTOMOBILES!

RADIO NETWORKS PROTEST RULING

NEW YORK, July 7.—(AP)—There may never be another coast-to-coast broadcast of a championship fight here if the state athletic commission enforces its edict barring professional announcers from the microphone.

Rather than submit to the commission's ruling that none but "boxing experts" shall be privileged to broadcast future bouts, both the National Broadcasting company and Columbia Broadcasting company have threatened to take the ring battles off the air.

The commission, as a result of the fare-up following the description of the Sharkey-Schmeling bout by Graham McNamee and Charles Francis Coe, announced that in future, the mikes must be manned by none but "boxing sports writers, judges or referees."

The answer of John F. Royal, vice president in charge of programs for NBC, was straight from the shoulder: "The National Broadcasting company always has and always will continue to select its own announcers for fight broadcasts."

There probably will be a show-down the next time a championship is settled hereabouts.

Match Play Starts In Northwest Meet

PORTLAND, Ore., July 7.—(AP)—Match play elimination rounds in the second annual Pacific northwest public links championship tournament began here today.

End Ward, of Elms, Wash., won medalist honors in Wednesday's qualifying round, shooting even par 71 for the morning round and cutting two off par in the afternoon for a 140. A score of 139 or better for the 18 holes was needed to qualify. Ten of the 32 qualifiers were from out of the state—eight from Washington and two from California—and the others were from Portland.

Little Rollie Is Burned By Cracker

CHICAGO, July 6.—(AP)—Rollie Hensley's Fourth of July celebration will keep him from helping the Cubs in their effort to regain first place in the National league for a week or more.

The eye was badly inflamed today and he was not expected to be back in action for at least a week, leaving Gabby Hartnett to do all the catching.

CHINESE MAY BUY LOT MORE WHEAT FROM AMERICA

CHICAGO, July 7.—(AP)—Chinese palates, whetted by 15,000,000 bushels of federal farm board wheat, may furnish American farmers with a new market larger than any they have ever had.

The National republic of China was "very anxious" to buy more, George S. Milnor, president of the Farmers' National Grain corporation, said, but the farm board "doesn't feel justified" in granting China's request for credit terms even more liberal than of the first bargain last year.

M. S. Briggs, representative of the grain corporation in Shanghai, reported to Milnor that more than 2,000,000 Chinese have been converted permanently from rice eaters to wheat consumers, and that an enormous market had been created for American grain in the Yangtze valley.

The 15,000,000 bushels purchased by China last fall were used to pay a million laborers to construct 2,000 miles of dikes and levees along the Yangtze, Briggs said.

"These people have learned," he wrote, "that they can work harder and longer on less wheat than on their customary rice."

The Chinese national food relief commission, which created the new market, will be forced to halt soon unless additional grain can be had, Briggs said, but it was working on an even more extensive program of construction in the hope of buying more wheat on easy credit.

Milnor said the farm board had \$9,000,000 "tie up" in extending credit to China and it would need additional funds before it could strike another bargain.

A bill pending before congress would authorize the secretary of agriculture to use \$40,000,000 in financing the exportation of wheat and cotton surpluses, but it may not be passed at this session.

"China paid us \$162,000 interest charges June 30 on notes it signed when it bought the wheat last fall," Milnor said. "They are meeting obligations promptly and probably will continue to do so, but the other side was on three-year credit terms. They want five years to pay for the next purchase, if consummated."

PATIENT HANGS SELF

Japs Complete Occupation Of Manchu State

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—The Japanese occupation of Manchuria—military, political and financial—has now reached the point where officials here view it as a virtually complete.

Railroads, public utilities and banks all have come under what American officials regard as "effective control" by the Manchukuo state, with the aid of Japanese "advisors."

This shows that roughly 1200 miles of Manchurian railroads, controlled by the Chinese at the time of Japan's attack on Mukden last September 18, are now under Japanese domination. These lines are strategically placed so as to dominate the military situation in the provinces. They furnish essential "feeders" to the South Manchurian and other lines previously operated by the Japanese.

In addition, the map shows other changes which the Japanese have made to improve the strategic value of Manchurian railroads. For instance, tracks of the line from Mukden to Shanhaiwan, over which Chinese troops from China proper might be sent into Manchuria, have been cut.

Also the line between Tientsin and Lianyungang has been cut, thus interrupting the traffic that might pass from Shanhaiwan to Angkai on the Chinese Eastern railroad without going through Mukden.

On the other hand, the Japanese are constructing a line to a gap in the Kirin-Hsiening railroad, which goes from Central Manchuria down into Japanese-controlled Korea. The Chinese government had strongly opposed completion of this section.

The names and values of Chinese public utilities and banks taken over by the Manchukuo authorities, with the aid of Japanese "advisors," are not available here. However, officials declare this control is "effective" and virtually complete.

Most of the Manchurian banks and public utilities were owned completely or in part and frequently were controlled by municipalities or provinces. In such cases, Japanese "advisors" have been placed on the directorates or controlling staffs of the institutions. Decisions of these advisors are said to be final.

Another phase of the Manchurian problem which is worrying officials here is the recent effort of the Manchukuo government to take over collection of customs.

The state department, although saying little now, has not weakened in its opposition to Japan's campaign in Manchuria. It is not unlikely, however, that there will be any further diplomatic moves by the United States or the league of nations, until after the league's investigating commission makes its report.

OLYMPIA NOT TO FEED MARCHERS

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 7.—(AP)—This city has washed its hands of the responsibility of caring for unemployed who have converged here and those contemplating joining their comrades, in an attempt to bring about a special legislative session for relief.

The city council has passed a resolution that the city would not be responsible for either food or housing for new arrivals. Those already here, however, are to be cared for by the city.

The council's action notwithstanding, calls had been sent to Seattle and Tacoma for immediate reinforcements and reports from the unemployed here said the appeals would be met with new caravans to the state capital today and tomorrow. They have been asked to bring their own food.

Russia Mobilizes To Harvest Crops

MOSCOW, July 7.—(AP)—Joseph Stalin, Russia's strong man and Vyacheslav Molotov, foreign minister, issued a joint decree today calling for mobilization of the nation's agricultural resources to insure the success of the harvest of all crops.

Ordering an avoidance of the mistakes of last year resulting in large losses of crops, the decree called for the extension of the piece work system in repayment for labor on collective state farms.

A scale of bonuses was set up involving increments in money and crops for those exceeding quotas. A reduction in wages for those falling behind was provided.

Whipping Post Is Brought Into Use

MILLERSBURG, O., July 7.—(AP)—The whipping post has been returned to Holmes county for the first time in 50 years as a device to "eradicate crime and lawlessness."

Before approximately 300 silent townspeople late yesterday, Jess Wynn, 51, and his brother, William, 48, were given 20 lashes by Sheriff John Stevens for stealing a \$8 ice box.

When they pleaded guilty to the theft charges, the brothers were told to choose between 30 days in jail on a bread and water diet and the whipping.

Hoover, Roosevelt Invited to Fair

SYRACUSE, N. Y., July 7.—(AP)—New York state wants both Herbert Hoover and Franklin D. Roosevelt to attend the state fair in September.

An invitation to address the fair will be sent the president, J. Edgar Hoover, director of the fair, is announced.

The New York governor customarily attends the fair. If President Hoover accepts the addresses of two presidential candidates, the fair will be on separate days Adams said.

Earwig Parasites Coming to Eugene

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 7.—(AP)—Colonies of parasitized male earwigs are to be distributed in at least 10 communities in nine Oregon counties through co-operative arrangement between the Oregon State college extension service, experiment station, the city of Portland.

The parasitized earwig will be supplied by Portland at cost to the communities wanting them and the extension service is helping to place the colonies.

Lane county will receive about 5,000 of the insects, half of which are to be released in Eugene.
