TODAY'S RECIPES

NEARLY every housekeeper goes through the unpleasant experience of finding the cream has "turned" and can't be used for the breakfast cereal and coffee. But this same sour cream can be used to make some special delicacy of inimitable flavor.

Cakes and cookies made with sour cream have a deliciousness of flavor and perfection of texture quite impossible to gain by other means. Aside from this sour cream is very easy to use and makes for less work in the kitchen.

There are many ways to use sour cream other than in baked-stuffs. Foreign cookery uses sour cream in soups and meat sauces. We make delicious salad dressing and cake filling as well as pie fillings and frostings. Really, almost any course in the meal gains richness and flavor by the addition of sour cream, so why worry about "waste" if the cream does turn sour?

When sour cream is used in cakes and cookies, very little other shortening is required. The richness of the cream naturally determines the amount of additional shortening. There are two grades of sour cream just as there are two grades of sweet. Table or coffee cream is light and contains less butter fat than the heavy cream we use for whipping.

On souring, the light cream separates in two layers. The fat rises to the top and the milk which is left in the cream settles to the bottom. If the cream is skimmed from the top, it is the same as heavy cream, but if the top and bottom are stirred together the result is less rich and some other shortening then must be used.

Soda is used as with sour milk. Too much soda gives an unpleasant flavor and injures the color of the baked-stuff. Remember that one-half teaspoon soda is used with one cup of sour cream and be careful not to over-measure. The amount of baking powder ordinarily used is reduced one-half.

Heavy, solid cream is used to make pie or tart fillings, sour

The next meeting for the group comes in early September.

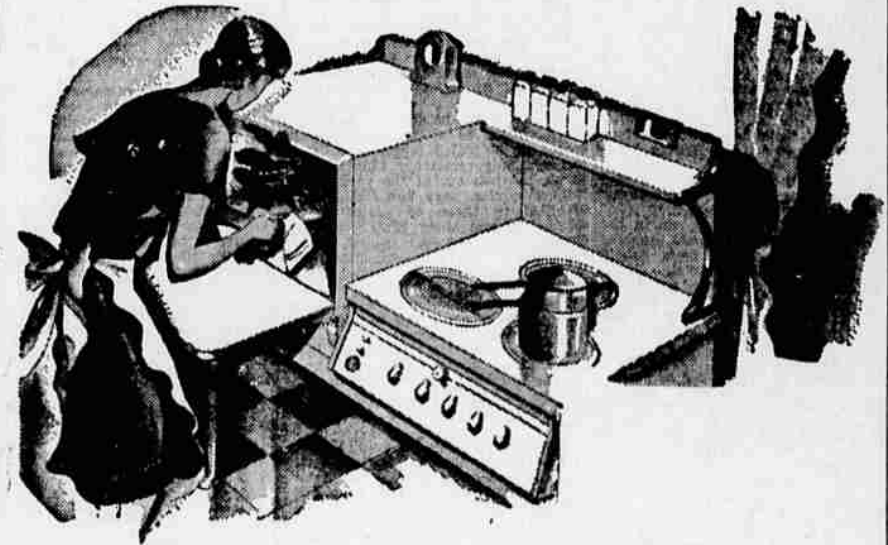
Campus Gathering Is Planned
