Hawley On Pan

A resolution denouncing Congressmen William C. Hawley for his opposition in regard to the national soldiers' home, now located at Roseburg, expected to be a storm center for the Friday afternoon session. The resolutions committee, headed by Lafe Manning, held sessions lasting far into the night Thursday, and were still at work at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Notice was expected to be taken of, and a denial made, of a charge appearing in this week's Colliers, to the effect that opposition to the choosing of Roseburg as a site for the soldiers' home was headed by an organized group in Eugene, and was a "minority cause" rather than a general feeling on the part of veterans all over the state.

Body Insignia Up

Besides the resolution opposing the Zorn-Macpherson school-moving bill, a resolution was passed at the morning session providing that a proper insignia be placed in the future upon the Buddy Poppy, making clear the fact that the poppies are made by disabled veterans who have no compensation whatever from the government, and that all proceeds above the cost of manufacture go to state and national relief for veterans, widows, and orphans. A resolution thanking the city of Eugene and the various service organizations for their welcome was also passed.

Speakers for the afternoon session Friday included National Commander DeCoe, Captain Charles Brown, department commander of the state of Washington, and Harvey Starkweather and James Mott, respectively democratic and republican candidates for senator in place of Hawley.

Public Meet Planned

Friday evening the big public initiation by the championship degree team of Waldo Caulfield post, a Portland, will be held. Recruits from posts all over the state will be given the work. The state department commander's silver cup will be given to the Peninsula post, Portland, for having the largest increase in membership percentage in the past year. Another feature of the evening will be the presentation of the Dr. W. G. Scott cup to Waldo Caulfield post as champion drill team. Saturday morning will be devoted to closing business sessions, and to nomination and election of officers on the part of both the veterans and the auxiliary. Installation and adjournment will take place early in the afternoon.

Among Friday arrivals were several prominent delegates and visitors, including C. R. Christie, national council member, V. F. W., and Mrs. Christie, national chaplain and state president of the department of Washington, Captain Charles Brown, department commander of Washington, Jack Day, United States Marshal; Barney Garrett, publisher of the Veterans' Reveille, official V. F. W. magazine, and of the St. Helena Mist, a past department commander, and A. Chancellor, also of St. Helena, past post commander.

Total membership of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in Oregon is 2408, according to official figures read Thursday afternoon by Quartermaster Walton in his annual report. This is a gain since last year of approximately 600. Six new posts were added during the year, and 6 more are expected to be organized within the next 30 days.

The memorial service and competitive drill occupied the meeting of the ladies' auxiliary of the V. F. W. Friday afternoon. Friday morning was spent on routine resolutions and by-laws.

Appointment of committees was accomplished at the opening session Thursday afternoon. Appointments are as follows: resolutions, Jill Pearson, Ross Whitney, Bessie Cling, credentials, Florence Newsom, Edith Alderman, Laura Bellinger; greetings, Bessie Kelly, Alice Sweetland, Laura Bellinger; by-laws, Martha Conley, Olive Hearn, Jane Hamberg; grievance, Alice Hoops; publicity, Blanche Fournier; assistant conductors, Eva Rush; assistant secretary, Edith Alderman. None of the meetings were open to the public.

Special recognition was accorded Mrs. Ada Clark, state hospital chairman, for her work in the veterans' hospital, and to Mrs. Ann Christie, national chaplain, in the ladies' auxiliary meeting Friday afternoon. The competitive drill between three champion teams, all of Portland, from "Pop," "Over the Top," and "World War" posts occupied the latter part of the afternoon.

"It is up to all of us, all the veterans' organizations, to stick together in the matter of legislation," said National Commander Harold DeCoe at the banquet tendered the Veterans of Foreign Wars and members of the ladies' auxiliary Thursday evening at the Eugene hotel. He asked those present to cooperate in every way with other organizations to bring about a better deal for the veteran. The same idea was seconded by Walter Banks, commander of the American Legion local post, and other speakers, including Dr. Paul R. Carter, of the Veterans' hospital in Portland, who spoke briefly of the service of the hospital to ex-service men and Cleora Hogan, claims officer at the hospital.

A large and enthusiastic crowd of veterans and their ladies attended the affair. One of the guests of honor was Hal Hoos, secretary of state, who made a special trip in order to be present for the evening.

The resolution rapping on the school moving bill reads as follows: "Whereas, An Initiative Measure designed to move the National School from Eugene to Corvallis and the Law School from Eugene to Salem and the three Normal Schools from Monmouth, Ashland and La Grande to Eugene will be submitted to the voters of the State of Oregon at the next November election; and

"Whereas, This Initiative Measure will, if adopted, be destructive in its results and, as pointed out by Governor Meier, who has publicly expressed his opposition to the measure, will be a tax increasing and not a tax saving measure; and

"Whereas, The University, Oregon State Agricultural College and the three Normal Schools are now controlled by a single body, the State Board of Higher Education, and this body has in a public announcement condemned the proposed Initiative Measure; and

"Whereas, Our educational system promotes good citizenship and strengthens every branch of Government and we are opposed to any and all measures which impair or weaken our educational system;

"Now, Therefore be it Resolved, That we, Veterans of Foreign

Were in Convention duly assembled at Eugene, Oregon, do hereby avow our opposition to the above mentioned school moving Initiative Measure; and be it further

"Resolved, That we respectfully recommend that the various Posts throughout the Department and the individual members thereof, use every honorable means to defeat said Measure at the coming election.

MILITARY EXPECTED TO RULE GERMANY

BERLIN, July 22.—(AP)—The famous iron hand of militaristic pre-war Germany ruled the Reich today with the possibility that General Kurt von Schleicher, defense minister, would succeed Franz von Papen as chancellor.

Politicians saw in the swift and amazing death of the Prussian cabinet and declaration of virtual martial law a definite plan to remodel completely the cabinet soon after the Reichstag elections of July 31. And in this shake-up the powerful and almost sphinx-like von Schleicher was seen as the dominant figure.

There was no doubt of the part von Schleicher played in the overnight "putsch" of the junkers government that ended state's rights in Prussia, ousted officials who had controlled the Prussian government and police force of 90,000 since the birth of the German republic, and practically nullified the effects of the German revolution.

When von Papen was named chancellor succeeding Dr. Heinrich Brüning, the military came back in control with von Schleicher as its marshal. Adolf Hitler's Fascists were expected to take an important share in the Reich government as a result of the elections. Although Hitler's enthusiasm has cooled for such inflammatory phrases as "Heads shall roll in the sand," he remained one of the most important figures in a complex political situation.

As the political shuffle appeared with the monarchists and militarists again riding high, it was proposed to give the Nazis the Reich ministries of interior, labor and transportation. Von Schleicher hoped by this move

he could successfully skim the revolutionary foam off the Fascist movement.

Success of the militarists' plans depended upon the attitude of the Nazi leader, Hitler.

BERLIN, July 22.—(AP)—Hugo Heilmann, chief of the Berlin police, was tumbled out of bed at 5 o'clock this morning by a squad of soldiers and led away to the military prison on suspicion of actions in contravention of the presidential decree imposing martial law in Berlin.

A major of police and a member of the Reichsbanner whose name is Carl-bergh were arrested with him.

Heilmann, one of the most popular members of the police force, was arrested on Wednesday, along with Albert Graessinski, commissioner of the Prussian police, when Graessinski and his chief assistants refused to relinquish their jobs at the demand of General von Rundstedt who is in charge of the execution of martial law. They were liberated in a few hours.

Oregon Repeal Group Forms Organization

Repeal of the state prohibition law and repeal of the 18th amendment are the two goals sought by the Crusaders, the Oregon branch of which was organized here Thursday with C. F. Adams, Portland banker, as state commander.

Authority to form the Oregon unit was received from Fred G. Clark of Cleveland, national commander.

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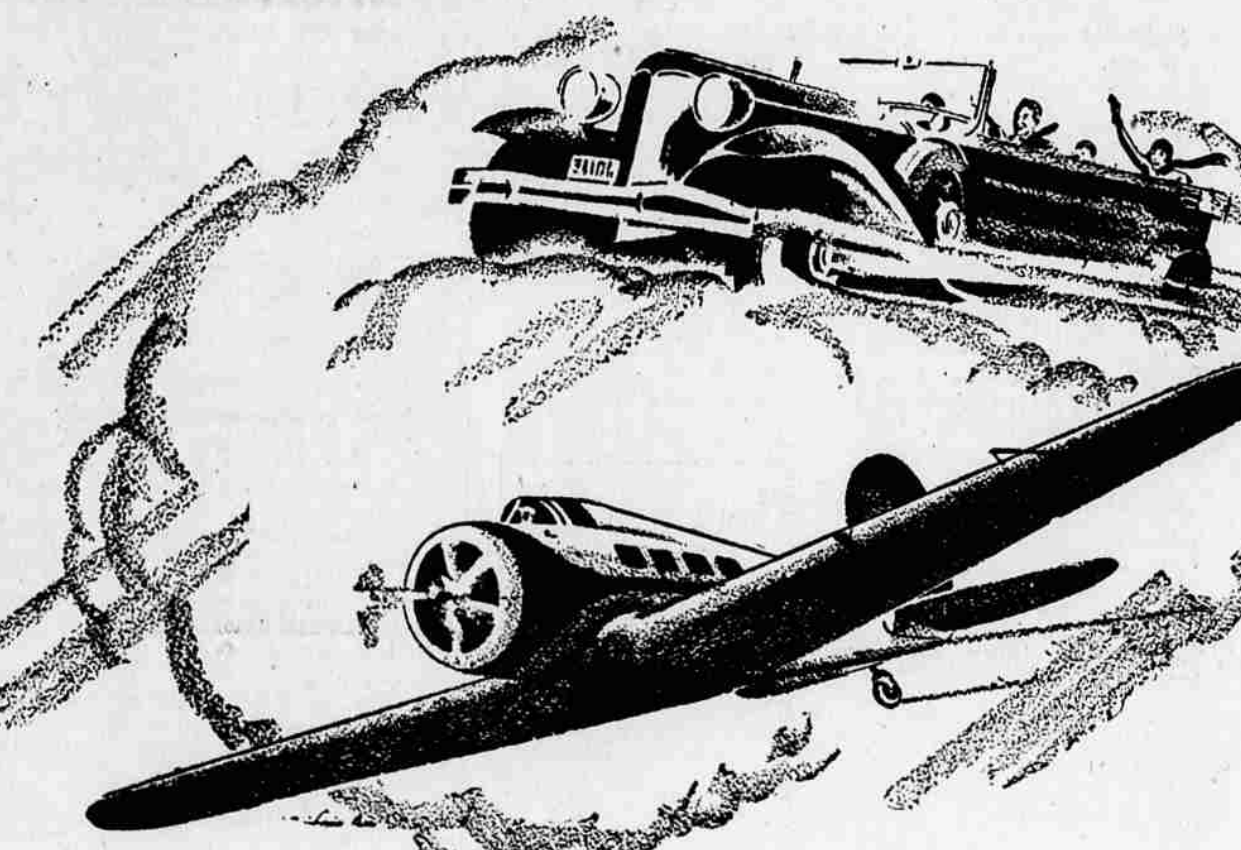
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
