REGISTRATION OF LEGIONNAIRES TO BE STARTED HERE
Registration of Eugene and Lane county legionnaires for the annual national convention of the American Legion in Portland, Sept. 12, 13, 14, 15, will be started in Eugene Monday, it was announced here Saturday by Harry N. Nelson, of Portland, chairman of the registration and information committee of the national convention, who was in Eugene conferring with local legion officials.
An information and hospitality center will be set up in Eugene so that persons en route to the convention city may stop here for information in regard to the convention and the country generally, Nelson said. He urged all legion members planning to attend the convention to register at once. Sid George, J. C. Koepke and Con Dillon have registration books.
When members register, they pay \$2 which entitles them to all convention privileges and in addition they receive a book containing 30 tickets which will admit them to various features of entertainment in Portland. These entertainments will include Jantzen park, races, boxing matches and many other events.
"In view of advance notices, convention headquarters in Portland expect an attendance in excess of 60,000 persons at the convention this summer," Nelson said. "There will be 12 ships in port in Portland bringing convention delegates from almost all over the world. For special train service to Portland and information from Canada, Alaska, Hawaii, England, Italy, France and Australia indicate that virtually every allied army will be represented at the convention."
Nelson said 500 members of the French legion had signified their intention of being present at the event. This is the first time in the history of the 14 years of the American Legion that the annual convention of the group has been held in the north-west.

Four men were shot and more than a score injured in a hand-to-hand battle between police and a crowd of Communists who stormed the city hall at St. Louis, Mo., to demand relief from aldermen and the mayor. In the above picture, two policemen are seen hurling tear gas bombs at the retreating demonstrators. One of the bombs is indicated by the arrow. Eight detectives and a patrolman were injured before the crowd, estimated at 1000, was dispersed. Forty alleged rioters were arrested. An order prohibiting public Communist meetings was issued by police following the riot.
