EARLY ACTION SOUGHT

Report On Finances Shows
Progress In Cutting
Down Debts

The Eugene city council at its meeting Wednesday night authorized the city attorney to act with a committee from the agricultural division of the chamber of commerce to draft an ordinance regulating the dumping of inferior produce from outside into Eugene.

The committee, consisting of Frank Metzger, Elmo Chase, William James and Lee Turner, appeared before the council and explained that this ordinance is drafted from surplus produce and often is far below the standard in quality. It is sold at a price that local growers cannot possibly meet.

Banks Take Bonds

The First National bank and the United States National bank of Eugene were awarded the two bond issues offered by the council. The two banks tendered a joint bid of \$20,522.50 for the \$21,500 issue of bank security bonds and the First National bid part on the \$30,681.53 issue of improvement bonds. Both issues are to draw 5% per cent interest. The banks are holding warrants to take the bonds and the sale of bonds is simply an exchange, and placing the city in a better financial situation. The warrants draw 6 per cent interest.

Plumbing Change Sought

An amendment to the city plumbing ordinance was offered and was referred to the sewer committee. This amendment would provide that in case a plumber goes ahead with a job without first obtaining a permit, he will be charged double fees. This provision is in the ordinance covering electric work.

Dr. Romig Appointed

Mayor Large appointed Dr. R. C. Romig as city health officer in place of Dr. S. M. Kerron, who recently resigned both as city and county health officer. Dr. Romig has been named county health officer by the county court. He is to receive \$50 a month from the city, the same as Dr. Kerron received.

But Air For Tires Still Free

GOING TO BUY A NEW automobile?

Get ready to fork over 3 per cent of the price to add Uncle Sam in raising the additional \$22,000,000 needed to balance his budget.

Going to buy a new truck? The tax that will be 2 per cent, estimated at \$1,000,000.

Need new parts and accessories to get your old back in condition, instead of buying a new one? The tax on these will be 2 per cent, estimated at \$1,000,000.

And do you need new tires and tubes? The government tax on these will be 2 cents a pound on the tires, 4 cents a pound on the tubes. These items are expected to yield another \$10,000,000.

For your tires—up to the present least—is still tax free.

But on a \$1000 automobile is \$20 in proportion. Since this is a manufacturer's tax, it does not go to second-hand cars.

Highly, the new tax on tires figures about 11 per cent of the retail price, the tax on tubes about 15

LOS ALTOS MURDER
PLOT IS REVEALED

Templeton's Sweetheart
Was To Furnish Alibi,
Police Say

SAN JOSE, Cal., July 28.—(AP)—A pretty blonde girl, who admitted she was in love with him, today substantiated the confession of George D. Templeton, Jr., 20-year-old University of California student, that he killed his aunt and critically wounded his uncle.

Miss Claire Burnette, 28, told Sheriff William Emig, that she had planned to tell officers that she was at her apartment in Oakland the night his aunt, Mrs. Lillian Babcock, Manila society woman, was slashed to death with a butcher knife.

A few hours after Mrs. Babcock was slain and her husband, W. R. Babcock, wealthy Manila importer, was seriously stabbed in the Los Altos home where they were visiting, the girl said Templeton visited her and declared:

"You are to be my alibi. I've told everyone I was in your apartment Tuesday night while I was in Los Altos. You've got to stand by me."

Before the scholarly "model student" could test the love of his attractive friend, however, he had calmly confessed to Sheriff Emig that he staged the brutal crime in the hope of his mother, who is Babcock's sister, might collect his victim's insurance.

Miss Burnette was located at her apartment last night and questioned. She declared she was a recent graduate of Vassar college. She said her father was a retired New York banker.

Unmoved by the murder charge which authorities expected to file against him today, the popular university student, calmly met his distraught parents in the jail here. He alone appeared at ease during the short meeting.

His father, Major George D. Templeton, retired army officer and former partner in the firm of Babcock and Templeton, said his son's defense probably would be based on a plea of mental aberration.

per cent. For instance, take a standard make six-ply tire of size 5.25x21, which fits numerous cars. The new tax adds \$1.15 to the price of this car, making it cost \$11.40 instead of \$10.25. On tubes of the same size, the tax has hiked the price from \$1.45 to \$2.25, or an increase of 50 cents.

Thus, a motorist who buys four new tires and four new tubes pays Uncle Sam about \$5.50 additional.

This tax is paid by the tire manufacturer. In some cases, dealers absorb it. Other dealers pass it on to the consumer.

The tire tax runs from the cradle to the grave—it applies to every form of rubber-tired vehicle from baby carriages to motor hearses. Even bicycles' wheels and children's rubber-tired toys are not exempt.

The tax on parts and accessories covers "any article, either useful or ornamental, to be attached to or used on a motor vehicle."

It includes spark plugs, storage batteries, leaf springs, coils, timers, tire chains, radiator ornaments, etc.

The tax on motorcycles is the same as on autos. There is no tax on tractor tires.

HITLER MAKES
FIERY THRF'

Democracy Is A Nazi
Adjures Followers
In Germany

CAMPAIGN DRAMATIC

Bloodshed At Elections On
Sunday Predicted
By Speakers

BERLIN, July 28.—(AP)—Democracy in Germany was given only a few more days of life today by Adolf Hitler, fiery national socialist leader.

Winding up a dashing airplane campaign for next Sunday's elections with a speech at Berlin stadium last night, Hitler brought thunderous cheers from 100,000 of his followers when he said:

"We will end democracy. We will remove the rule of democracy and of Marxism and its vassals from Germany and restore a regime of discipline, national conscience, honor and power."

"We aim," he continued, "to sweep the thirty political parties out of the country. We Germans must be a united people. We are on the eve of great historical decisions. The thirteen years of decadence (the life of the republic) are nearing an end."

"We don't believe in the possibilities for international aid, but only in aid founded on our own strength."

The Tuesday night radio speech of General Kurt von Schleicher continued to kick up a furor throughout the country. The Bavarian Courier, powerful organ of the Southern Volkspartei, said the general's reference to strengthening Germany's military power was hardly reconcilable with Chancellor von Papen's efforts for conciliation with France.

An "Oliver Cromwell" Hitler's campaign posters today set him up as "Germany's Oliver Cromwell" and referred to Cromwell's words uttered as he closed the British parliament and established his dictatorship nearly 300 years ago—"take away that bauble!"

The national socialist Premier Roder of Oldenburg, where a Nazi state government is in control, went one better than Hitler, who has said that "heads shall roll" when the Nazis come into power in the nation.

Roder, referring to the opponents of the Nazis, Roder said:

"I guarantee that these Schweine (pigs) will be sent to the gallows."

SILVERTON MURDER
CASE CLEANED UP

SALEM, July 28.—(AP)—Robert Ripley, on trial here for the murder of James Irwin, Silverton night watchman, on May 1, 1931, this noon entered a plea of guilty to first degree murder. His trial was started Tuesday and several witnesses for the state had already been heard.

Ripley was sentenced Saturday and it was reported he will be given life.

Dupree Poe, convicted of first degree murder in the same case was sentenced to a life term by Judge Fred W. Wilson here today. The jury in its verdict early Tuesday recommended the sentence.

Frank Manning, the third member of the trio charged with the killing, had previously entered a plea of guilty to second degree murder and turned state's evidence. His plea carried a life sentence and pronounced he will be made later, it was announced.

WACO, Tex., July 28.—(AP)—A mother's mistake of using poison in her cornbread batter was blamed today for the death of two children and illness of seven others.

A physician said Early Norman, 14, and Jack Norman, 8, were killed by "some acute poisoning." Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Norman and five children were seriously ill. They live on a farm near here.

A deadly poison was found on a kitchen shelf near the corn meal, and it was believed Mrs. Norman used the poison by mistake.

Amelia Will Fly
With Navy's Best

LOS ANGELES, July 28.—(AP)—After a forced landing en route from Salt Lake city which delayed her arrival here, Amelia Earhart, famous trans-Atlantic aviatrix, was to fly in a navy airplane today to San Diego for participation in an aerial review.

She will return to Los Angeles Friday and receive a distinguished flying cross from Vice-President Charles Curtis during dedication ceremonies for the new Los Angeles state building.

W. T. STOTT DEAD

FRANKLIN, Ind., July 28.—(AP)—William T. Stott, 65, managing editor of the Portland (Ore.) Telegram from 1919 to 1922, and prior to that time, city editor of the Chicago Tribune, died at his home here last night. He recently was identified with several trade journals in an editorial capacity.

Roosevelt Supporters Claim
Physical Impediments Will
Not Impair Their Candidate

EDITORS' NOTE:—Democratic leaders claim that a "whispering campaign" has been started concerning the health of Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt. The United Press presents herewith a story of the governor's health, and history of his paralysis case, as a factual objective news story in the light of public interest in the situation.

ALBANY, N. Y., July 28.—(AP)—Franklin D. Roosevelt's crippled legs, which he used to help steer a 40-foot yawl on a recent six-day sailing cruise, are gaining strength rapidly as he enters his campaign for the presidency.

Although the limbs which bear his 200-pound body have been shrunken by infantile paralysis, and once were useless, Roosevelt feels sure they eventually will be restored to practical normalcy.

The New York governor can make only a few strides without the aid of a cane or a helper. He can make little headway with a cane over short distances. He summons assistance when climbing stairs. He leans on a supporter when he takes long walks.

Roosevelt was cruising when he toppled out of a small boat while fishing, and caught cold. A few days later, after climbing from a swimming pool, he trotted some distance to a camp, and, without drying himself, sat in a draft. The cold grew worse. He was taken to a New York hospital.

"That same night," a friend said, "the governor became ill."

Roosevelt made his first strides toward recovery from the ailment in 1921 when he visited Warm Springs, Ga., to bathe in the healing southern waters. Attaches of his household said, however, that his greatest gains have been made in Albany since he became governor.

The democratic standard bearer usually walks about the executive mansion with a cane or a supporter despite the fact a wheel chair is at his disposal. He rarely uses it.

He wears iron braces when walking or standing. He releases them when not moving.

Roosevelt stands erect, a cane propped against his side, when he delivers an address. He has been known to remain standing an hour or more. Occasionally he stands without the cane for short periods.

A robust body with strong arms, large neck and sturdy hands top the means of getting around as a good horseman. He still is an expert swimmer. He can drive an automobile and does frequently.

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Hoover Working
For Short Week

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(AP)—President Hoover is considering a concerted campaign for general adoption of the short working week as a means of putting millions of the army of unemployed back at work.

The president will meet Monday with Governor John C. Winant and other members of the New England group has devised a plan for increasing employment by 10 per cent by spreading available work among as many men as possible. It adopted generally this would open up jobs to about 3,000,000 of the unemployed.

The White House intimated the meeting with the New England group may be but the first of a series of similar conferences.

Baldwin Pleads For Policy
Favorable To World
Wide Business

DISCUSSIONS GO ON

Britain Not Able To Offer
Exclusive Proposition
To Dominions

HOUSE OF COMMONS, OTTAWA, Ont., July 28.—(AP)—Stanley Baldwin, chief British delegate, presented to the Empire economic conference today a frank statement in which he pleaded that England is a good mother to her trade-hungry dominions, but he emphasized that she must also remain a friendly trade sister to all the world.

In a seven-page brief for Britain, Baldwin pointed out the preference given the dominions already on their raw products, showed that there is a visible trade balance of nearly \$500,000,000 at the normal pound sterling rate in favor of the dominions in their trade with Britain, and said of the foreign situation:

"Can't Sacrifice Trade"

"The United Kingdom delegation desires to emphasize to their colleagues the fact that the United Kingdom is so highly industrialized that it is vital to the physical existence of her people to find adequate markets for her products and that in fact more than half her export trade is taken by foreign countries."

"There are at the present moment 2,750,000 unemployed persons in the United Kingdom. Anything tending to check the foreign exports of the United Kingdom must lessen the purchasing and saving power of her people and so damage the markets on which the dominions so largely depend for the consumption of their produce."

"Have a Heart"

All this was a direct plea to the dominions to be reasonable in their request for preferential treatment.

As always with Baldwin, it was calculated to be impressive to the conference in its impressive friendly emphasis on facts which he believes to be incontrovertible.

AT FAIR PLANNED

Big Showing At Salem May
Take Place Of Local
Exposition

Lane county day at the Oregon state fair in Salem may be observed this year if plans now being contemplated are carried through. It was announced by E. G. Harlan, secretary of the county chamber of commerce, who conferred with Max Gehlhar, director of the state department of agriculture, in regard to this matter.

Mr. Gehlhar has requested that Lane county take over one day of the fair and has agreed to have a section of the grand stand reserved for Lane county persons during that day. The Eugene chamber of commerce and the Lane county chamber officials are working on the matter and have outlined tentative plans for the day in the event the county decides to accept the offer of Gehlhar.

According to present tentative plans, the various communities of the county would be asked to present different features on that day," said Mr. Harlan. "For instance, Warfield and Oakridge might present contests in log sawing and tree chopping while other communities could present entertainment features of some sort.

The main feature of the Lane county program would be a program by the Eugene Gleemen in the evening."
