

'CONGRESS DANCES' PLAYS FIRST RUN AT COLONIAL SOON

The Colonial theatre, for the second time in two weeks, has been selected to play first run in Eugene, one of the season's best show attractions—and this time will get the picture even before it plays Portland and other larger Northwest cities. It was announced Friday by the management, following receipt of a telegram confirming the contract for exclusive showing of "Congress Dances." The picture distributed by United Artists Corporation, arrived in the United States after breaking every record for attendance in London, Berlin, Paris and other European cities.

"Congress Dances," like "Doomed Battalion" will play four days, August 3 to 6, at regular prices at the Colonial, the theatre preferring to keep the picture for four full days rather than stage one or two performances at advanced prices.

"Congress Dances" takes the audience back to 1814—time of intrigue, romance, gay and luring music. It has for its central theme the love of the great Russian Czar, Alexander I for a pretty little shop girl. While many complicated and intriguing situations develop, the picture moves along easily—with delicious comedy interwoven.

The picture brings to the attention of American audiences a star for whom a career that will surpass that of Marlene Dietrich and other importations—Lillian Harvey. Not only is Miss Harvey now an international beauty, but she has a voice of great charm. Supporting her is Lil Dagover, now well known in America; Conrad Veidt, Henry Garat and a score of others who can act and sing with real ability.

While "Congress Dances" has an absorbing story and a great cast, it is winning wide acclaim for the music it has brought with it. Two song hits, "Once for All Time" and "Live, Laugh and Love" are now sweeping the country.

The picture will play matinee and evening starting next Wednesday and arrangements are being made to take care of an even greater crowd than those at the "Doomed Battalion."
