Ham Salad
Two cups finely chopped cooked ham, 1/2 cup chopped celery, 1 green pepper, 1/2 cup stuffed olives, 1 cup cooked salad dressing, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatin, 2 tablespoons cold water, 1-2 cup boiling water, 1/2 cup orange juice.

Soften gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Add to boiling water and stir until dissolved. Add orange juice and when cool and beginning to jelly fold in salad dressing. Add remaining ingredients and turn into mold. Let stand on ice for several hours to chill and become firm. Unmold and serve with cucumber cream dressing.

"Ivory For All Soap Purposes" Say Women Now

Stores Report Country-Wide Record-Breaking Sales of Ivory at New Low Prices
(Special Dispatch)

CINCINNATI, O., July 20.—Recent reduction of prices for Ivory Soap to the 1915 level has brought a flood of letters and telegrams from every state in the Union to the Procter & Gamble offices here, giving sensational evidence that Ivory sales are beating all records.

From Syracuse comes word that women are no longer buying Ivory one or two cakes at a time, but by the dozen and half dozen. New York says stores with the largest stocks of Ivory two weeks ago are pressing for new supplies. In Omaha, Ivory Soap is beating every previous record ten to one.
