DON HILL, BENNY WILSON TO MEET IN SPECIAL EVENT

It will be Texas against the world at the fairgrounds tonight on Herb Owen's big open air card. Cyclone Mackey, of Galveston, will meet Eugene's pride, George "Wildcat" Pete, and another boy from the Lone Star state, Benny Wilson of Brownstone, will take on the popular Don Hill in the 45 minute special, beginning at 8:30.

The main event promises more in speed and spectacular wrestling than any bout staged here this year. If Mackey lives up to his notices, Pete will be in for a busy evening. And Owen states that Wilson, Mackey's fellow Texan, has the best set of clippings any wrestler has ever brought here.

Owen wishes it to be distinctly understood that neither Hill or Wilson are accustomed to taking a special event spot, and says that they are only doing so to become better acquainted with the fans in preparation for later main events.

Mackey reached town late night, and says he is in the pink of condition. He is confident of his ability to tame the Wildcat, and will be giving everything he has to insure a shot at the best later.

Promoter Owen believes that Wilson will also go over big with local fans. Wilson is one of the most popular boys ever to show in his home state, and states that Texas "Teddy" Waters, famed exponent of the "whale" hold, who wrestled here some time back, has nothing on him.

Summer wrestling has been distinctly on the upgrade here this year, and promises to hit a high spot in the Pete-Mackey match. Don Hill has developed a host of followers here, who will all be out to watch him tangle with the tough Texan. From all indications, a record crowd should be on hand.

As a special favor to the boxing commission, all who possibly can are requested to purchase their tickets in time, to help minimize the crush around the ticket booth at the fair grounds.

NEW YORK, July 29.—(U.P.)—Roy, would it be well to have an Aladdin's lamp?

You could drag that baby out, pull off its shirt, give it a couple of brisk rubs and swish-sh-h-h-h! You'd be plopped down in the Roland Garros stadium in Paris.

Yes, sir, and that's right where we'd like to be today—at Roland Garros waiting on Vines and Borotra to start business in the Davis Cup challenge round. We wouldn't mind a little bit in the middle of that noisy, hostile and ready French crowd. They'd probably pull our ears off for yelling against France, but we'd take the chance.

For the battle for the cup this year promises to furnish more fireworks than a country fair on closing night. The thing has got a dozen well-dramatic angles. Not on the least of these angles is Jean Borotra, the old bantam, who is back in the ring. Jean has been insisting he was through with Davis Cup singles—too old. Then, at the last minute, his country drafts him, and he draws Vines in the first match.

The French take the cup very seriously, and M. Jean will call upon his aging limbs for all he's got today. And don't be surprised if he gives the California boy quite a run for his money. It's hard to see him beating Ellsworth, but he's liable to make things interesting.

Then there's the angle furnished by Wilmer Allison, the red-necked Texan who was named for Frank Shields in the singles. Wilmer stands a beautiful chance to become one of two things, (a) hero, (b) goat. All the Davis Cup committee has asked him to do is to play three matches within 48 hours.

He plays Cochet today. Tomorrow he pairs with Van Ryn in the doubles. And on Sunday he takes on Borotra. If he wins them all he'll be the guy of the hour. If he loses them all, on two of them—well, let's not think about that. Let's think about something more pleasant. Let's think about how Frank Shields must feel, sitting on the sidelines watching somebody do his work.

Sometimes it seems as if fate has decided to pop Frank on the head every time he threatens to hit the top in tennis. The man seems destined to be a runner-up. He finished second to Dugg in the 1930 nationals. This year he wound up in the same place against Greg Mangin in the indoor championships. And this year, he found his name after a short start, only to lose it when he needed it most.

And we happen to know how badly Frank wanted to make good this year. The way he and Wood fought against Great Britain last year ranked him. Early in the season Frank told us that for this year, at least, he was going to put tennis ahead of everything in an effort to make a strong showing in the cup match.

Ray Murray, the coach, has given a great deal of his time to developing the youngsters, and the legion has supported the boys unstintingly. The kids have practiced religiously, and it is the duty of every baseball fan hereabouts to come out Tuesday night and give the team a big sendoff.

Eugene high is looking forward to a victory over University high's gridiron warriors this fall. Early in the season though it is the Kramersmen, upset 7 to 6 last year, are thinking of scores to wipe out. Each season previous to the one approaching, Eugene has been dotted to win by a large score. FEUDS DEVELOPE AS OLYMPIC GAMES APPROACH OPENING

LOS ANGELES, July 29.—(U.P.)—Pre-Olympic feuds which were just reaching the feverish stage today belied the lofty motives and ideals ascribed to the international games.

So far the feuds have been largely intra-national. There is, however, a smattering of international discord which is certain to flare into the open before the amateur sports extravaganza is opened by Vice-President Curtis on Saturday.

International or intra-national, the feuds, arguments, fist fights, gunplay, immunities and open charges today completely overshadowed the final preparations for renewal of the historic games.

There were no less than seven upheavals. These were:

1—Argentina's fight for official control of its athletes.

2—Charges that Canada's women's relay swimming team was "hand picked."

3—The appeal of Mayor Porter of Los Angeles for funding of the games, and his charges that easterners "let down" the U. S. team.

4—Paavo Nurmi's suspension on grounds of professionalism.

5—A similar suspension given to Jules Ladoumègne of France.

6—Stella Walsh's last-minute decision to run for Poland instead of the United States.

7—Disqualification of Levi Casey of the Los Angeles A. C., after he had apparently qualified for the hop, step and jump event on the U. S. team.

Most Spectacular
Most spectacular, of course, was the Argentine matter. Removal of Dr. A. C. Guadino as president of his country's team, starting as it was, came only as an anti-climax to the first-fighting and fist-drawing done by some of the South American athletes.

Janet Sheather of Toronto, was not selected as member of her country's relay team and her mother is said to have prepared a formal Olympic committee protesting charging that the selection was based on personal preferences rather than athletic merit.

Mayor Porter blamed the \$100,000 U. S. Olympic budget shortage on "eastern avarice" and begged for individual contributions of between \$250 and \$500 from "public spirited" Los Angeles citizens. Failure to raise this hundred thousand will result in America's loss of the Olympic championship.

The Nurmi story is an old one and the final chapter will be known on Friday when Finland's appeal for his reinstatement will be passed upon.

Similarly, International Amateur Athletic Federation officials are expected to rule finally on the bid of Ladoumègne, brilliant French middle distance runner, for restoration to amateur status.

Stella Walsh's case may not even be discussed. This great woman athlete decided only a few days ago that she would not accept the U. S. citizenship which she could have had by signing her name to a document. Instead, unless complications arise, she will run in a Polish track suit.

She lost her job with the New York Central railroad at Cleveland, Poland gave her a governmental position.

Most mysterious is the matter of Levi Casey of the Los Angeles Athletic club. He apparently had qualified for the hop, step and jump event on the U. S. team. But the American Olympic forces would not allow him to become a team member. Instead he was dropped.

George Grantham's ninth-inning home run, scoring two runners ahead of him, gave the Cincinnati Reds a 7 to 4 win over the Phillies.

Paavo Nurmi, the Phantom Finn and most celebrated runner in the world, will not crown his dream of starring at his fourth Olympic meet. The council, and commission of the I. A. A. F. refused his entry, declaring that he had padded his expense account for a tour in Germany in 1931. Nurmi's suspension removed the most colorful figure among athletes expected to participate in the Los Angeles Olympics.

The commission appointed by the International Amateur Athletic federation, pursuant to its rules, to manage the track and field events of the tenth Olympiad, having carefully reviewed the evidence before it and having heard the representatives of the Finnish Amateur Athletic union in Nurmi's behalf, was without avail.

This rule proved to be a surprise. Its use was possible because the membership of the council and the commission is identical.

The rule was interpreted as giving the commission exclusive powers to reject or accept an athlete's entry. Accordingly, the decision was regarded as final. At any rate, should the Finnish delegation make a further appeal to the general meeting of the I. A. A. F., that body never has reversed a finding of its council.

Reports were current around Olympic village that the entire Finnish team might withdraw if Nurmi was banned. Officials of the Finnish team refused to comment.

Nurmi was charged specifically with having padded expense accounts and thus being no longer eligible for amateur competition.

He challenged the accusation and the Finnish Amateur Athletic association found him not guilty.

Thus the recommendation of the I. A. A. F.'s council was the first important one in which it turned down the finding of an association of the country to which an athlete belonged.

Benny Leonard
Beats Townsend

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NURMI SUSPENDED; COUNCIL REFUSES TO ACCEPT ENTRY
