FARMERS' HOLIDAY WILL BE DECLARED

DES MOINES, July 30.—(AP)—A "farmers' holiday" called to raise the prices of farm products, will begin in Iowa August 15, it was announced today by Milo Reno, president of the Farmers Holiday association in this state.
The "holiday" will last for 30 days, Reno said, and he predicted that the movement will spread to other states.
Reno said it was decided at a meeting of representatives of approximately 75 county farm holiday organizations today to begin the strike August 15 or before, "at the discretion of the executive committee."
The holiday organization has adopted as its slogan, "Stay at home, sell nothing," during the 30 day period.
Paraguay Determined To Resist Bolivia
ASUNCION, Paraguay, July 30.—(AP)—Dr. Jose Guggiarini, president of Paraguay, in an interview today declared any new attacks in the Chaco by Bolivia will mean "the commencement of war."
"We don't worry about any new attacks from Bolivia," the president said.
"These will mean the commencement of war provoked by Bolivia."
"Paraguay is firmly determined to resist with decision and courage."
Meanwhile the same unusual activity of recent days was noticeable at government house today. American, Brazilian and Uruguayan diplomats conferred at the foreign office.

RUSSIA EXPECTING ATTACK BY JAPAN

HARBIN, Manchuria, July 30.—(AP)—New accounts of large scale preparations by the soviet government to fortify Vladivostok harbor and to prepare the people of Vladivostok against an expected attack by Japan were being brought here by travelers from the Siberian seaport.
Residents of the city, according to these reports, are being made familiar with underground shelters prepared against bombardment, and are receiving instructions in the use of gas masks and rifles.
Troops, transported in closed cars and disembarked at night, arrive daily, it is said. Observers told of seeing ten armored trains in Vladivostok railway yards as well as fifty tanks, sixty airplanes and numerous artillery units.
Meanwhile, Russian business houses in Harbin are closing and soviet citizens are going back home, apparently in the belief Japan intends to absorb Manchuria completely. More than 2,000 troops have left Harbin during the last two months on orders from Moscow.
The most competent soviet engineers and technicians have been withdrawn from the Chinese Eastern railway, jointly owned by Russia and China, and the Moscow authorities have removed hundreds of locomotives and most of the road's best rolling stock.
These moves have led to the belief that Russia is getting ready to abandon the road, which is operated at a great loss. The 400 mile stretch from Harbin to Vladivostok is out of operation.
The staff of the soviet bank here has been reduced more than 50 per cent and the soviet naphtha syndicate is preparing to withdraw. Many foreign and native business men are leaving for southern China.

GRADE A MILK STORY

tion, a cement floor is required with proper trapped drain in gutter and proper space behind cows for grades A, B, and C milk. On the matter of floor cleaning, the regulations state that the barn floor must be either washed or swept with dry lime daily, that there must be no accumulation beyond one milking, and that floors, walls, ceilings, etc., must be kept out of the milking barn. The walls and ceiling has to be tight if there are feedstuffs over it. The barnyard must be graded and drained properly and kept clean. Every breeding in manure in the barnyard, and the manure, if not put on the land at once, must be at least 50 feet from the barn and covered with a light coating of lime to prevent fly breeding.
Milk House Vital
For the milk house, the regulations call for a floor of cement and one graded to drain. The walls should be plastered or in some finish easily cleaned. Ample lighting should be provided, at least 15 per cent of floor area. Doors and windows should be kept fly tight. The milk house should not open directly into the barn, but should be close enough so that each half of milk can be taken to the milk house as milked. The water supply should be accessible, adequate, and of good quality.
The utensils should be of a construction easily cleaned and good pair. They must look and feel clean, some chemical compound being necessary because soap is rated not satisfactory. After thoroughly cleaning all utensils should be sterilized with steam or some chlorine compound.
Everything Sterile
The sterilizing rinse water should be clean, but not hot. Hot water brought to the milk house from the kitchen will be accepted. A sterilizing rack should be provided in the milk house where the pails and cans should be inverted to drain and air after sterilizing. The utensils should not be stored outside the milk house. In working up the utensils, there should be no handling of surfaces to which milk is exposed, the hands and handles being used.
Under milking regulations, it is provided that the udders and teats be clean, washed with some chlorine solution; that the flanks be cleaned of all visible dirt; that the milkers' hands be clean, disinfected, that his clothing be clean; that the milk stools be clean for every milking; that the milk be removed immediately after milking each cow to the milk house, no straining being allowed in the barn. NEW BUSINESS OF WEST COAST MILLS ABOVE PRODUCTION

SEATTLE, July 30.—(AP)—A total of 321 mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending July 23 operated at 18.8 per cent of capacity, as compared to 19.1 per cent of capacity for the previous week and 39.3 per cent of capacity for the same week last year. During the week 212 of these plants were reported as down and 109 as operating.
Current new business of 21 identical mills was 3.4 per cent over production. This group reported production approximately one-half million feet more than the previous week. Shipments for the week were 2.0 per cent over production.
Inventories, as reported by 141 mills, decreased 2,018 feet (M) from the week ending July 16 and are 22.8 per cent less than at this time last year.
Unfilled orders decreased 400,000 feet from the previous week. New export business received during the week was 7,038,000 feet less than the volume reported for the previous week. New domestic cargo orders were 2,910,000 feet under the previous week, new retail business increased 1,504,000 feet while the local trade increased 140,000 feet from the previous week's business.

BORAH TO CARRY ON HIS CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, July 30.—(AP)—Senator Borah, of Idaho, will carry forward his campaign for a world economic conference and a special Wednesday night at Minneapolis under non-partisan auspices. The senator is undecided whether he will make a further speaking tour.
An invitation to the United States to attend the proposed monetary and economic conference has been received by the state department from the British embassy. It provides that reparations, debts and tariffs rates are not to be discussed at the party. The invitation says that among the monetary matters to be discussed is the question of silver. No time or place for the conference was given.
The United States was invited to name a member of the organizing committee at Geneva which is arranging for the conference. This country also was advised to name an economist and a financial expert to assist the preparatory committee drawing up the program.
