### SCIENTIST LESSON SUBJECT IS "LOVE"

"Love" was the subject of the lesson-sermon in the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Sunday, July 31. The Golden Text was, "We have known and believed the love that God hath to us. God is love; and he that dwelleth in love dwelleth in God, and God in him" (1 John 4:16). Among the citations which comprised the lesson-sermon was the following from the Bible: "If ye fulfil the royal law according to the scripture, thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself, ye do well" (James 2:8). The lesson-sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "It should be thoroughly understood that all men have one Mind, one God and Father, one Life, Truth, and Love. Mankind will become perfect in proportion as this fact becomes apparent, war will cease and the true brotherhood of man will be established. . . . and blessed is that man who seeketh his brother's need and supplieth it, seeking his own in another's good" (pp. 467, 518).
