

WEATHER IN JULY COOLER THAN FOR PAST TEN YEARS

July, 1932, was the coolest July in Eugene in the past ten years, according to the report on the weather of the month announced at the office of G. M. deBroekert, local weather observer for the government.

The maximum temperature during the month was 83 degrees and the lowest was 40, the latter being the lowest mark the mercury reached in all the ten years except in 1920, when it dropped to 39.

There was more rainfall last month than in any other July during the ten-year period, a total of .30 of an inch having been received here. There were 17 clear days during the month, 18 partly clear and one day that was entirely cloudy.
