July Quiet Month For Eugene Police

Months of 1932 was one of the quietest months the Eugene police department has had in some time. Fines levied during the month amounted to but \$11 as compared with \$124 in June and \$555 for July of 1931.

A total of 107 arrests were recorded. The itemized report showed: Arrests: Traffic, 56; auto theft, 3; drunk, 9; investigation, 4; larceny, 2; disorderly conduct, 2; forgery, 1; trespassing, 39; holdups, 3; break and enter, 3.

Thefts reported: Automobiles, 2; all recovered; bicycles, 16; five recovered; from houses, 25; from automobiles, 11. Break and enters, 6; missing persons, 2; found; runaway boys and girls, 3; found.

Accidents, 42, total for 1932, 376; given lodging, 113; doors open, 3; long distance calls, 4 from outside; stolen automobiles recovered for other cities, 2.

Oil On McKenzie Starts This Week

Oiling on the unfinished sections of the McKenzie highway will be started Thursday. The work will be done as fast as possible, according to E. A. Collier, state highway division engineer, who was in Eugene Wednesday.

Collier, H. G. Smith, construction engineer of the highway department, and J. C. Compton, contractor in charge of oiling, went up the McKenzie in the afternoon to get the work started.

The oiling will probably not be completed this year, but as much will be done as is possible, Mr. Collier said. The Hendricks, Bridge-Boyle tilt section, nine miles long, the 15 mile section under construction and 10 miles of road east of Blue River will be worked on.
