YOUR CHILDREN

If the young mother thinks that winter is the time to watch the thermometer, I should like to remind her that summer is quite as important. Nothing can guide her about the baby's clothing as well as a thermometer. Her own feelings are not to be depended upon. She may be warm on a cool day and cool on a hot day. It would be a mistake to think that the baby is the same way.

In the first place I should ask the doctor about what weight of shirts he recommends for summer use. All cotton of gauge weight is popular now, or a cotton-and-silk weave. Some doctors still advise the use of the "band" in some form or another, the kind with the shoulder straps being preferred. The rolled band is fast winning in popularity as the new idea is not to bind abdominal muscles but to allow them freedom to strengthen themselves.

In summer most specialists recommend only the thin loose "band" in place of a shirt. But a shirt should be handy so that if the wind blows up cool it is there to slip over bare little shoulders.

It is the same with outer clothing. To be in style, a baby under eight months doesn't own a dress except for those occasions when he must be presentable in public. I should have a few on hand, of course, but the dress as the "piece de resistance" of a young baby's wardrobe has taken a back seat. This is particularly true in summer when his regular uniform will be a band and diaper.

Here are Bare Facts
Let him go in bare legs and feet, too. But have ready soft little socks and socks, or long stockings, depending on his age, to slip on when the thermometer rises. If mornings are very cool there is the little knitted sweater also to keep him from chilling.

In a city there are not likely to be so many sudden changes. But in the suburbs or country, or at mountain or seaside resorts a greater variety of emergency clothing is necessary.

On roasting days in town, a baby over eight months can do very well without a diaper. This is, of course, a thing his (or her) mother must think about. He must not be in a wind, he must be perfectly well, and again it depends on that thermometer.

Let me urge that you get specific instructions from the doctor. No two babies are alike and they vary in age and reactions. And again temperatures vary greatly even in the same section.

But we have discovered that summer complaint is aggravated by too much, not too little dressing. It is well to remember that, and by far the best way to provide for quick changes of weather.

Let me urge, too, that you watch the sun these days. In midsummer a little sun goes a great way—another thing to be done, if possible, under a doctor's guidance. A baby should have his sun bath early in the day, not all day. Shade or a cool darkened room through the hottest hours is advised.

After a red-hot day nights often get very cold in some districts. Watch this. Night clothes must make up for the drop in temperature. Do not let the baby chill.

TODAY'S RECIPES

If your salad is prepared in the cool of the morning and the lettuce washed and crisped ready to use, you will find that the meal is practically ready when you want to serve it.

Many salads must stand several hours before serving. Jellied salads usually require at least two hours to become firm and may stand for 24 hours without harm.

Frozen salads may be left almost indefinitely in the drawer of an electric refrigerator or may be left for five or six hours packed in ice and salt if the salt water is turned off occasionally to prevent it from getting into the molds.

Jellied Cucumber and Pineapple Salad
One cucumber, 1½ tablespoons cold water, 1-3 cup boiling water, 4 tablespoons sugar, 4 tablespoons vinegar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1½ cups crushed canned pineapple, lettuce, mayonnaise, French dressing.

Pare cucumber and cut in quarters lengthwise. Scrape out large seeds and chop pulp. Squeeze lightly in cheesecloth and let drain a few minutes. Soak gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Dissolve in boiling water and add sugar, salt, vinegar and lemon juice. When jelly begins to thicken add prepared cucumber and pineapple. Turn into individual molds and let stand on ice until chilled and firm. Unmold and serve on a bed of lettuce. Pour French dressing over each mold and garnish with mayonnaise.

Frozen Fruit Salad
One cup dried fruit, 1-3 cup grape fruit pulp, 1 teaspoon granulated gelatin, 2 tablespoons cold water, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1-2 cup whipping cream, 1-2 cup mayonnaise, 1-8 teaspoon salt, paprika, lettuce. Soak gelatin in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Add lemon juice

slowly and add the mixture to mayonnaise dressing. Whip cream until light and gradually beat in mayonnaise. Add fruit which has stood in a heavy syrup for one hour. Season with salt and paprika. Pack in individual molds and cover with two thicknesses of heavy waxed paper held in place with rubber bands. Pack in three parts ice to one part salad and let stand three hours or longer. Or freeze in drawer of refrigerator. Unmold and serve on a bed of lettuce with French dressing combined with one-half cup cherry flavored prepared gelatin.

Let the jelly begin to set before beating in the dressing.

BLACK TEAS
A tea extract, made from heavier, richer types of tea, known as "black teas," is excellent for iced tea when you want to keep a supply on hand throughout the day and evening. One recipe calls for three teaspoonsful of tea for each cup of water. After the water boils the tea leaves are added, the liquid steeps for exactly five minutes. The brew is poured off the leaves and cooked without aid of refrigeration. One-third of a glass of this extract is used with water and ice.
