

HIGHWAY TO SEA SURVEYS WILL BE ANNOUNCED SOON

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Announcement that the results of surveys of the new "short route to the sea" will soon be made public came today as the highway commission, with Chairman Leslie M. Scott presiding, held its regular meeting.

The engineers are now making the final comparisons, according to Scott and within a week the figures will be released. After these have been under consideration by the general public for several days, a public meeting will be held at which advocates of each route will present their case.

In expectation that results of the surveys would be released today, advocates of several routes appeared ready to put their cases before the commission, but were forestalled by Scott's announcement.

The commission gave brief consideration without reaching any tangible decision on what to do with the federal appropriation of \$132,000 under the Odde-Colton law for construction of highways across public lands.

Q. How did you pass on them?

Tax League "Used"

Q. The substance of it is that the Tax League was used to put over the bill?

A. No.

Q. You didn't pay for it?

A. No. Our organization is a state organization. Anyone can belong to it, wherever he resides.

Another barrage of questions was shot at John Henare when he came to the stand next. Ramage admitted that he acted as treasurer among three persons, himself, Zorn and Mr. Stevens. He said that he had authorized the printing of the petitions and that Zorn paid for the first batch,

about 1500 copies.

"Who paid directly?" Collier asked.

A. Zorn, through a check I gave him. The rest I paid for myself.

Q. The money all came through you?

A. Yes.

Q. Your own money?

A. It was contributed.

Q. Contributed by whom?

A. Ridgeway and Johnson.

Q. Had the Tax League paid for any?

A. Through contributions, yes.

Q. Contributions made to you as treasurer?

A. No.

Q. It came to you as an individual didn't it?

A. Yes.

Q. It never went into the coffers of the Tax League did it?

A. The understanding was I was to act as treasurer. I considered any money I was paying out was for the League.

Q. Your League has 2000 members and you, as treasurer did not deposit the money and pay it out as treasurer?

A. I did not.

Q. Do you know who your contributors were?

A. Ridgeway and Johnson.

Q. Did they contribute?

A. I don't know.

Q. Did you ever contribute anything to the League?

A. I paid my own expenses. I figured that a contribution.

Q. How much money did you receive as treasurer?

A. I was paid about \$500, from Ridgeway and Johnson and through the Portland office."

Q. You were given \$500 once by a chauffeur?

A. Yes.

Q. Why were you paid by a chauffeur in currency?

A. I don't know.

Q. Do you know who the chauffeur was?

A. It was dark. I couldn't see.

F. D. Swisher, in charge of the circulation of petitions for Sam Stocum, and James W. Gleason, deputy county clerk in charge of elections, were next called and gave technical testimony regarding the travels of the petitions from the time they were brought in to their respective offices until they were lodged in the safe in Brownell's office, from where some 20,000 signatures were assertedly stolen the night of July 4.
