

GRUMBLING BONUS ARMY STRAGGLERS PREPARE TO MOVE

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Confusion grips the tottering suburban camp of the bonus expeditionary force again today, as its leaders and city officials hurry the tattered army from the city.

Quiet—a grim sullen quiet—rules the camp after minor disturbances broke in the glare of campfires where disgruntled groups refused to sleep.

Liquor was smuggled into the field last night. There was some wrangling and a few fist fights, but officers quickly put down the trouble and tightened precautionary measures. Officers said persons not members of the B. E. F. started the arguments.

News that the California contingent, first to leave by special train after the evacuation order, had been halted in Chicago without definite promise of going on, reached the camp last night and added to the confusion as veterans demanded assurance that they would not meet a similar fate.

Mayor Eddie McCloskey announced the last train will leave with eastern contingents about noon today. Highway trucks will carry the remainder, mostly Eastern Pennsylvanians, to their home towns.

Hundreds of men, women and children, waiting in dilapidated automobiles for a supply of gasoline, bided for hours or tramped to city hall to demand "service."

Camp officials said less than 900 were in the camp at daybreak and McCloskey said they will be moved if possible before daylight.

McKenzie to Get Second Oil Coat

SPRINGFIELD, Aug. 5.—(Special)—Equipment to begin oiling the McKenzie highway arrived at the Southern Pacific depot Thursday afternoon and was set up Friday morning. Two sections of the highway are to be given a second coat of oil and the section now being surfaced from Leaburg to Nimrod will get its first application if it is finished in time.

J. C. Compton and company of McMinnville have the contract for the oiling. Work on the Blue River section, extending east from that town 10 miles, will be done first, and then the road will be oiled from Hendricks

bridge to Doyle hill. Both these stretches were treated last year. If the weather remains suitable for the work and the surfacing of the Leaburg-Nimrod section is completed, that part will also be oiled. Contractors expressed doubt that the entire distance would be surfaced until late in the fall, however.

Plane Has Engine Trouble Over Pass
