

FINANCE GROUP NOT "EASY TOUCH"

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The Reconstruction Finance Corporation is showing no signs of being "easy touch" in its handling of the states.

The corporation has granted \$10,000,000 for Pennsylvania, and likely will approve \$10,000,000 for Illinois.

The Illinois \$10,000,000 on a \$17,750,000 of relief has been sold and spent and the relief agencies in the state soon will have to close without federal aid. This got \$852,000 for use in the counties, and yesterday \$1,000,000 was advanced to Detroit for the needs of local programs.

light relief costs. Governor Lane's statewide relief committee will meet probably within the next 10 days to apply for some of this money

and allot shares to the counties. The counties will have until 1935 to start paying this money back.

2. Loans by Reconstruction Finance Corporation for self liquidating projects, such as toll bridges and other projects whose cost is not paid by taxation. It is under this section that money for a toll bridge at Florence may be made available. The toll on the bridge would pay for its cost over a period of years.

Here's Big One

3. Loans for public works. Under this section the government has set aside \$322,224,000 to be spent over the nation in new construction and maintenance of old projects. Of this sum \$120,000,000 will go on federal aid highways. So under this section funds for the Willamette and Siuslaw (federal aid projects) will be available. Money used on these roads must be paid back within 10 years.

Funds to pay it back with may be taken from future appropriations which may be made by congress or allotted by the bureau of public roads. The county would thus only be getting an advance of money that is coming to it sometime anyway.

Lane county will benefit in other ways than those for which the county court will make application. The Cascade and Siuslaw national forests will get part of the \$18,000,000 that has been allotted for forest road and trail construction. P. A. Thompson and R. S. Shelley, supervisors of those forests, have not yet received notification of what sums they will receive for work here.

The city of Eugene is contemplating applying for money for public improvements. Commission at Work

The state highway commission was in session in Portland Friday to make plans for the distribution of Oregon's share of the public works money.

A few days ago the Coast Highway association in a meeting at Reedsport petitioned the state highway commission for the construction of wooden bridges over the bays where ferries are now operating. Ferry crossings are now made by motorists on the coast highway at North Bend, Reedsport, Florence, Waldport and Newport. There has been some talk of making these bridge toll structures to conform to the federal aid act and ask for federal funds to build the bridges. If this course were adopted in official circles Lane county would probably join in applying for funds for the bridge over the Siuslaw river at Florence.

Thursday's temperatures rang up new high marks for the year. At Medford the high was 108. The Dalles had 104, Roseburg 102, Salem 102, Wolf Creek 100, Umatilla 100, Eugene 100, Baker 98, Coos Bay 95, Seaside 90, Portland 95, Albany 90.

FOREST FIRES RAGE
PORTLAND, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Blazing heat, low humidity and burning

winds have conspired to increase the forest fire hazard in Oregon, and in several sections in the state flames have leaped beyond control.

The situation in the Vernonia district was the most acute and between 300 and 400 men were on the fire front attempting to hold within control the flames sweeping land operated by the Clark and Wilson Logging company.

Twenty small slashing fires put a smoke haze over the entire Coos bay country yesterday. The largest blaze was near Powers where 200 acres of slashings and felled timber

burned. The fire hazard there is said to be acute.

102 AT SALEM
SALEM, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Forenoon thermometer readings here today, running parallel with that of yesterday, gave indications that the peak of 102 degrees of the previous day would again be reached during the afternoon hours. At 11 o'clock today the thermometer read 87 degrees.

The 102 degrees here yesterday was declared the hottest weather at the state capital for five years. It

exceeded the previous high mark of the year Wednesday by 8 degrees.

LA GRANDE HAS 94
LA GRANDE, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—The maximum temperature Thursday duplicated that of Wednesday in La Grande—94 above. Today's temperature was expected to be as high or higher with the mercury at 82 above at 10 a. m.

ROSEBURG VERY HOT
ROSEBURG, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The maximum temperature of 102 degrees reached here yesterday, has been exceeded only once in the month of August during the 55 years for

which records have been maintained by the local station of the U. S. weather bureau. In August of 1894 the mercury reached 104 degrees. Yesterday's temperature was equalled in 1898. The highest ever recorded here was 107 degrees in July, 1926.

BEND FEELS BAD
BEND, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Heat records for 1932 were broken here today when the temperature jumped to 95 degrees. And the sheriff seized 340 quarts of home brew last night, after a day in which the mercury soared to 94. Bend's all-time high record is 104 degrees, recorded in June, 1928.
