

ACHIU DROPS CLOSE MATCH TO MACKY; REAGAN IS TRICKED

Ballet Master Macky, misnamed Cyclone, edged out a 2 out of 3 falls decision over Sneezy Achiu Friday night at the fair grounds in a match featured by Macky's jumping tactics, and an unlooked for quantity of rough stuff. Wildcat Pete took a turn at the deceptive rackets, only practicing on him last week, and bent Pat Reagan, also 2 out of 3, in the 45 minute event.

In the 2 hour final, both men were cautious at the outset, finally mixing it after several minutes of circling and dance steps by the Texan. The wrestling was even, with neither man having a decided advantage, and was climaxed by Macky gathering up Achiu's legs and spinning him several times, then dropping him to the mat with a body press. Sneezy returned to annex the second fall in 10 minutes with a leg split, following a good deal of slapping and rabbit punching. Both wrestlers cut loose after the intermission, with Achiu getting in several of his damaging Sonnenbergs, and Macky torturing the Chinese with headlocks and arm stretches.

Achiu Sonnenberged Macky, and slapped on another leg split. The fans got up to go, believing that the Texan was through for the night, but he refused to give up, and finally broke the hold. Achiu threw him all over the ring with headlocks, Macky simulating grogginess. He snatched out of it to apply a Boston crab that forced the ex-footballer to give up. The fall came in 22 minutes.

Pat Reagan let Sneezy Pete outsmart him to win the 45-minute event, not including several moments when the lights went out and Pete, Reagan, and Referee Vern Harrington mixed it in the middle of the ring. Reagan pulled the big surprise of the evening by rolling out of Pete's chin lock and pinning him with a body press after three minutes of wrestling. Pete returned to almost immediately apply a surfboard, the fall coming in two minutes. The third fall came after a hectic session featured by the short circuit of the big light over the ring. Harrington finally parted the two combatants and the break was repaired. Pete won in nine minutes, Sonnenberging the Irishman when he glanced up at the lights, following Pete's pointing finger.

On account of the Dempsey fight, to be held in Portland next Friday, the match for the coming week has been set up to Thursday night, Owen announced.

PORTLAND STARS BOTH LOSE GAMES

Portland's invasion of Southern California has produced exactly no results to date for the Beavers. The Angels beat them Friday night for the fourth straight time, 11 to 8. It was a free-hitting contest, each team registering 13 times. Portland got three homers, including one by Berzer with two men on base. Los Angeles is now only two and one-half games behind the second-place Hollywood Stars.

Hollywood took its second straight defeat from the Senators, 4 to 1, as Louis Vinel pitched six-hit ball for Sacramento. The two defeats prevented the Stars from taking advantage of Portland's losing streak to approach first place in the percentage column.

Bert Cole pitched a seven-hit game as the Missions beat Seattle 6 to 1 to win the series. John "Junk" Walters pitched seven innings for the Indians, being retired after the Reds had made three runs off five hits. Freitas replaced him and prevented further scoring.

Oakland took a three-to-one lead in the series by beating San Francisco, 2 to 0. Three hits bunched in the third inning turned the trick for the Oaks.

and same here to study engineering, graduating in 1909. Among his classmates were Virgil Earl, now dean of men at the University, and Dr. O. F. Lodge, public health officer here until recently.

McClain played football, basketball and baseball while in the university and he was the first president of the Order of the O. He never gave up his interest in Oregon athletics.

Taught in University
After graduation, Mr. McClain taught in the university till 1914 when he gave up teaching to go to work for the Eugene water board. He left the board in 1915 and went to Cornell where he took advanced work in engineering for the utility field, and on leaving Cornell he spent two years as construction engineer for the water department of the city of Cleveland.

In 1918, Mr. McClain returned to Eugene to take up the position of water board superintendent. Under his supervision, practically all of the modern Eugene plant has been built—the reservoirs in Fairmount and on College hill and Skinner's Butte, the new lines which bring city water from the McKenzie, the new filter plant, and the new Leaburg power project.

Under his management an expansion program involving millions has been carried on and held off out of revenues of the plants and with a constant lowering of rates in all classes of service.

Member of Societies
Mr. McClain was a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, the American Association of Engineers, the American Water Works Association, and of numerous social and fraternal organizations including the Odd Fellows, the Woodmen, and the Kiwanis club. He was a member, and an officer of the First Presbyterian church.

He is survived by Mrs. McClain, by a daughter, Miss Dora McClain; his mother, Mrs. Carolyn McClain; his brother, Merion McClain, manager of the University Co-op; a sister, Mrs. D. L. Lewis; and by a brother, A. M. McClain, of Nampa, Idaho.

The funeral will be held Monday at 3:30 o'clock, with interment in the new L. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. Milton S. Weber will conduct the services at the Vench chapel.

M'ARTHUR IS NAMED M'CLAIN SUCCESSOR

J. W. McArthur, supervising engineer for the Eugene water board for the past 10 years, was elevated Friday night to the office of acting superintendent and secretary at a special meeting of the board, Mr. McArthur succeeds to the position made vacant by the sudden death of his friend and associate of many years, Carl A. McClain.

Mr. McArthur, who was in Tillamook county when notified of Mr. McClain's death, was expected to return to Eugene Saturday night.

Mr. McArthur's first connection with the water board was in 1908 and 1909 when he did the surveying for the Waterville power plant. In 1913 he was elected a member of the water board, serving in that capacity until 1925. He is a graduate of the University of Oregon, holding the bachelor of science and civil engineering degrees from that institution. In 1916, he received the degree of master of civil engineering from Cornell university, following study under the McGraw fellowship.

Mr. McArthur and Mr. McClain became friends as classmates at the University of Oregon. Following their graduation, they were partners in the engineering firm of McClain and McArthur in Springfield, Mr. McArthur served as city engineer for Lebanon for five years and was Lane county bridge superintendent for another five years, supervising engineer, he has been in charge of construction of the Leaburg power project, the new steam standby plant and the new filtration plant in Eugene. He is a member of the state commission for formation of new districts.

With Mrs. McArthur, he makes his home at 1873 Garden avenue. He is a member of the Rotary club, the I. O. O. F. lodge, the Fairmount Presbyterian church and many engineer's organizations.

Offices of the Eugene water board will close at 1 o'clock Monday afternoon, to remain closed the rest of the day in memory of Mr. McClain.

RACE IS DESCRIBED

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—(AP)—On a day that called for a big band for a great little guy, Bill Carr, for his marvelous 400-meter triumph over Ben Eastman in 40.2 seconds, and that also might have been given over to means for the first Olympic 5000-meter, champion, the Tenth Olympiad was rocked today by reverberations of the greatest upheaval since the battle of 1908.

The center figure of the controversy was Lauri Lehtinen, Finland's greatest young runner and disputed winner of the 5000-meter final over Ralph Hill, American boy who came within three inches of shutting out the Finn completely in the Olympic long distance "flat" races.

Duel Is Described
The cause was Lehtinen's interference with Hill in an extraordinary street duel, during which the Finn three times crossed his American rival in clear violation of rules as well as ethics in an international meet upholding the highest ideals of sportsmanship.

Not since the 1908 games when an American, Carpenter, was disqualified for alleged interference with the British star, Halswell, and the race record as a "walkover" for Halswell because the Yankees refused to accept the decision, has there been anything like the outbreak of feeling that followed Lehtinen's victory.

Officially it will stand, with Lehtinen getting the gold medal and Hill sharing with him the new Olympic record of 14:30, because the two were so close together that the watches at the finish showed no difference in time. But it will be a long time before the debate is closed or Finland's exultation greeted with the more or less sympathetic reaction to her previous setback here, the disbarment of Nurni on the eve of the games.

No Protest Made
The Americans refused to make a formal protest, although the national president of the Amateur Athletic Union, Avery Brundage of Chicago, made no attempt to conceal his displeasure and made public a statement, saying: "Although the A. A. U. considers the race was not fairly run, neither Mr. Hill nor the United States will protest."

Lehtinen and other Finns insisted no interference was attempted and even Hill, reluctant to enter into any discussion at all, asserted his belief his rival did not "mean" to interfere, but in an outspoken statement, Gus

Miss Hapner succeeded in getting the little girl ashore, Bobby Davis assisted Winther and managed to get hold of him by the hair, but his attempt failed and he was barely able to make it to the bank himself. Ben F. Russell, Jack Montgomery and Ben Stafford of the plant rushed to the river to help. They were too late to save the boy. They went into the water and brought out the Winther boy's body. Russell said Saturday he believes young Winther's feet became stuck in the sand and sediment on the river bottom.

Erle Winther was born in Eugene Oct. 20, 1920, and lived here all his life. He was the son of R. L. Winther of Wabash, Neb., and lived with his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Jena Elgstad. Besides them he was survived by a brother, Vilas, of Wabash, and three sisters, Margaret, of Wabash, Gladys of Weeping Water, Neb., and Wilma and Shirley of Eugene.

Funeral services will be Aug. 8 at 2 o'clock at the Brannstrom-Simon chapel. Rev. Lewis Larsen of Emanuel Lutheran church, will officiate. William A. Clark was swimming across the Klamath river, relatives who witnessed his drowning said, when he suddenly threw up his hands and went under the water. He did not rise again. They said he was then suffering from heart trouble.

His body was recovered at 9:30 p. m. by W. A. Cochran, Chester Taylor and Ben Snyder of route 2, Eugene.

He is survived by his mother, three sisters and three brothers. The brothers and sisters are Clarence, Albert and Charles Clark and Alice and Wilma Clark and Mrs. Elva Bebe.

FIRE HAZARDS INCREASE
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6.—(AP)—The hazard increasing daily as high temperatures, hot winds and low humidity conspire to dry the forests, new fires blazed in Oregon woods today.

At Cochran the Washburn Lumber company mill was destroyed last night with a loss estimated at \$20,000. A barn full of hay, nearby, burned to the ground. Flames came within 500 feet of the buildings in the tiny community of Glenwood. Backfiring operations saved three donkey engines owned by the McNary Logging company.

The fire near the head of Gales creek in the same section assumed serious proportions during the night, spreading on an eight-mile front, and covering 1500 acres of slashings. About 200 men were on the fire line. The Vernonia blaze near St. Helens broke out of control last night after
