Farewell Party Is Tendered at Monroe

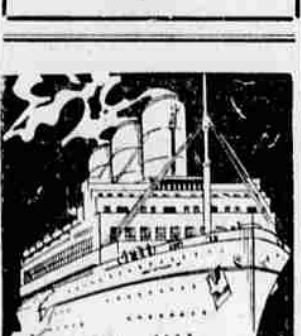
