tion of taxis in New York. The official record is the best proof. There was no legislation in the interest of him or any other individual.

Walker then thumbed over his own printed reply to the Seabury charges, as filed with Governor Roosevelt, until he found the page where he cited the various ordinances governing the operation of taxicabs in New York City and read them into the record.

Walker then launched into a defense of the board of taxicabs con-

trol, instituted by him recently and the members of which are his appointees.

"I named that board only after conferring with civic leaders of the city," he said.

"Let's go back to the first part, the going into the pool," Roosevelt interrupted. "What did you think would happen?"

"I thought it was a real thing," Walker replied. "It was one of those things—among gentlemen."
