The close fitting cloche, the tiny turban, the small hats with varied brims, and the sailor, all worn far down over the right eye, were shown at the association's annual fall show last night. Bows led to trimmings and a great many feather effects were shown, placed to the fore of the hat.

The skull-shaped and beret crowns were favored with many folds, shirred, tucked and stitched effects featured. Brims were popular but they were narrow and often turned up close around the crown in a variety of new ways.

Felt, new crepe-like wools, velvet cloth and some dull silks were shown for daytime. Velvets led for evening with shirred, transparent velvet and chenille favored. Soleil felt, satin, and a number of feathered turbans were for formal wear.

Black was the predominant color with brown and red, shading from deep wine tone to a brilliant orange red, next in favor.

YOUR CHILDREN

HOW many mothers are watching radio announcements of child talks this summer?

There have been so many good ones that I hope not a word of them has been wasted. Yet some women will turn on an orchestra concert the moment an address is begun.

This is a mistake. Some of the finest addresses ever made in this country have been broadcast. What is the difference if you are sitting in a dollar seat somewhere or in your own living-room at home? Prejudice of this kind will never get us anywhere.

There is always something to learn. No matter how many books we may have read on the care and happiness of children, how many lectures we may have attended, or how much experience we may have had, there is ever some new and helpful point to be added to our store.

I know of no other field of science in which a new finding is so quickly and generously passed along as in this one of child care. Ideas change in regard to babies—not so much that older theories are wrong, but that new ones are often better.

Why set our faces against it? Why take the attitude that we know enough?

After all, the doctor on whom we depend for advice on diet and health cannot be with us every hour of the day. Countless matters come up in which a mother must use her own judgment. Sometimes that judgment is good, sometimes not. It is necessary to have some source of reliable information about matters that we cannot possibly know ourselves, unless we keep an open mind and learn from ourselves wherever we may.

Fortunately not many women feel that they do not need to be told. The fact that the free lectures of a certain child-welfare society recently drew audiences of 5000 women speaks for itself. This advice of mothers therefore is not to the many—they do not need it—but to the few.

If you go to a lecture or listen to one over the radio, it is wise to keep a pencil and pad on your lap to take quick notes for reference.

TODAY'S RECIPES

AUGUST is the month for picnics and outdoor meals. A well-packed hamper and a carefully planned menu make these good times doubly enjoyable.

Planning a picnic menu is as important as planning any other meal. Careless, haphazard picnic meals contribute to loss in weight and lowered resistance and send children back to school in poor condition for beginning the year's work. Unfortunately, it is the children who are the chief sufferers, for, their needs are seldom considered.

The choice of a balanced diet is one of the most important single factors in maintaining health and the same principles of nutrition must be kept in mind for every meal planned.

The simplest picnic is the one composed of sandwiches, fruit and a drink. The sandwiches must satisfy hunger and provide nourishment and at the same time be easy to digest.

The fruit and drink do their share in the way of vitamins and mineral constituents, and, of course, the drink quenches thirst. Milk for children aids nourishment.

The picnic which is a bit more elaborate adds a salad to the sandwiches and little cakes or cookies to the fruit. In this menu the salad may add protein or the sandwiches may still be the main source of this food element. If a meat of fish salad is chosen, the sandwiches should be made with vegetables. The vegetable salad needs meat, cheese and nut sandwiches to round out the meal. It's a good deal to carry the salad ingredients in separate containers and combine them when ready to serve.

A hot dish is added to the salad and sandwich menu when the picnic takes the place of dinner at home. A "one-piece" dish which combines vegetables and meat or a macaroni or rice combination dish is an excellent choice. Scalloped potatoes with ham, scalloped tomatoes with bacon, scalloped cauliflower in cheese sauce, combinations of vegetables with meat cooked en casserole, stuffed baked vegetables—the dishes are innumerable that are suitable for such a meal. These dishes are easily carried in the dish in which they were baked and can be kept hot several hours if wrapped in many thicknesses of newspaper.
