SEPTEMBER 26 IS DESIGNATED LANE DAY AT BIG FAIR

In answer to a request that Monday, Sept. 26, the opening day of the state fair be assigned to Lane county, a letter was received Friday at the Eugene chamber of commerce from Max Gehlhar, director of the fair, stating that this date had been reserved for a Lane county day. Mr. Gehlhar also indicated that he would come to Eugene on Friday evening of next week when the county committee will meet in the chamber rooms to put into definite shape the program outlined to date.

Director Gehlhar also stated that Lane county would like to join with Lane county and assist in putting on the program and local people have indicated they would be pleased to have Lane county join and put on a Lane day. Bill Hayward, University of Oregon coach, announced he would be glad to help secure the Hill brothers of Klamath Falls who will put on an exhibition race.

Monday will be the feature day of the fair and the largest crowd of the week is expected. All school children of high school age will be admitted free and the family bargain admission of \$1 to admit all members of a family, together with automobile, will also stimulate attendance. Special sections of the grandstand will be reserved for Lane and Linn county people. Railroads will be asked to make a special rate to the fair.

The Oregon Loggers, who are to be featured in the program for Lane county day at the state fair at Salem, September 26, gave a private performance before E. C. Harlan, secretary of the chamber of commerce, and Mrs. Mabel H.
