

HOOVER SPEECH STORY

revision of railway laws, federal regulation of interstate power, conservation of national resources, tax and banking reform, balanced budget, federal economy, the St. Lawrence seaway and adherence to the world court with reservations.

In reference to foreign affairs, but without mentioning the situation between Japan and China last winter or the current Chinese dispute between Bolivia and Paraguay, he told of having projected into international diplomacy the new doctrine "that we do not and never will recognize title to possession of territory gained in violation of the peace pact."

VIEWS CONTRASTED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—(AP)—This is what presidential candidates of the two big parties say about some of the country's problems:

PROHIBITION

Hoover—"It is my belief that in order to remedy present evils a change is necessary by which we resumption a proper share of initiative and responsibility which the very essence of our government demands shall rest upon the states and local authorities. That change must avoid return of the saloon."

Roosevelt—"I am confident that the United States of America wants to repeal... When that happens as we democrats must and will... enable the states to protect themselves against the importation of intoxicating liquors where such importations may violate their state laws. We must rightly and morally prevent the return of the saloon."

TARIFF

Hoover—"I am squarely for a protective tariff. I am against the proposal of a 'competitive tariff for revenue' as advocated by our opponents. That would place our farmers and our workers in competition with peasant and sweated labor products."

Roosevelt—"I accept that admirable tariff statement in the platform of this convention (advocating a 'competitive tariff for revenue' with a fact-finding tariff commission free from executive interference). Tariffs should be high enough to maintain living standards which we set for ourselves."

RECONSTRUCTION

Hoover—"It is my duty to organize the private industrial and financial resources of the country to co-operate effectively with the federal government in instrumentalities which we have in motion so that... we may move from defense to powerful attack... Recovery may be slow but we will succeed."

Roosevelt—"When we get the chance, the federal government will assume bold leadership... Our republican leaders tell us economic laws... cause panics which no one could prevent. We must lay hold of the fact that economic laws are not made by nature. They are made by human beings."

WAR DEBTS

Hoover—"I am for a particular annual payment we were offered some other tangible form of compensation such as expansion of markets for American agriculture and labor, and the restoration and maintenance of our prosperity, then I am sure our citizens would consider such a proposal. But it is a certainty that these debts must not be cancelled or the burdens transferred to our people."

Roosevelt—"The debts will not be a problem—we shall not let them cancel them... Our policy declares for payment, but at the same time for lowered tariffs and a resumption of trade which opens the way for payment."

FARM RELIEF

Hoover—"The most practical relief to the farmer today aside from the general economic recovery is a definite program of readjustment and re-orientation of national, state and local taxation which will relieve real property, especially the farms, from unfair burden."

Roosevelt—"The practical way to help the farmer is by an arrangement that will... do something toward the reduction of the surpluses of staple commodities. Farm mortgages reach nearly ten billions of dollars... Our immediate concern should be to reduce the interest burden on these mortgages."

TAXATION

Hoover—"The first necessity of the nation... is to reduce expenditures on government, state, national and local. It is the relief of taxes from the backs of men which liberates their powers."

Roosevelt—"For three long years I have been going up and down this country preaching that government—federal and state and local—costs too much. I shall not stop that preaching."

The supreme court does not meet until Aug. 19.

Donnelly, rebuffed in three courts, today obtained from Justice Harold J. H. Human of the appellate division of the supreme court, an order instructing Mr. Roosevelt to explain his jurisdiction. The governor directed Attorney General John J. Bennett, Jr., to prepare argument of the legality of the action.

Browne Prepares For Tokio Flight

COPALIS BEACH, Wash., Aug. 12.—(AP)—Nat Brown, Texas cowboy-aviator, who plans another non-stop flight attempt from Seattle to Tokyo late this month, made two successful takeoffs with heavy loads in his new monoplane at Copalis Beach today.

In the first test with a load of 3400 pounds the plane rose easily and gained altitude quickly. In a second test with a load of 5,000 pounds, Brown took off after a run of about a mile and a quarter along the beach.

He planned further tests this afternoon. He will return later to Boeing field and install huge gasoline tanks in the plane before making final plans for the flight.

menting on the Oregon situation and the school consolidation bill, a general tendency throughout the country to coordinate the work of schools of higher education. He said he has studied the Oregon system and the proposed changes but he prefers to carry discussions to members of the board rather than to the public.

"It is apparent," he said, "that throughout the land there is a tendency toward some form of coordination. No two states are going at the task alike and there is no reason why they should."

"In recent years there has been a number of surveys made of higher education in various states, including North Carolina, Georgia and California. In the latter state the executives are trying to determine what their future policy shall be. It is easy to see that no two states have identical problems, but most work out their educational destinies according to the conditions prevalent in their particular regions."

Dr. Zook is no stranger to Oregon. He has been here many times, and attended a regional educational conference here last year. He is personally acquainted with Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of Oregon State college and with Arnold Bennett Hall, president of University of Oregon. He had much praise for both executives and for the work of both schools.

Not Like Teddy

"Theodore Roosevelt would not have cited the rebellion against government of seven states and then to meet it propose to give the whole thing over to the states. He would have said, 'this government is under obligations to enforce the constitution of the republic and every state is under moral and patriotic obligations to cooperate. If any state refuses that cooperation I will double the executive force in that territory until the laws of the land are respected and obeyed.'"

Improvement Seen In Lumber Industry

SEATTLE, Aug. 12.—(AP)—A summary prepared by the West Coast Lumbermen's association today revealed what the organization termed a "slight improvement" in the lumber industry during July.

The association reported that in July mills in the Douglas fir region reported sales at 127 per cent of production; shipments at nearly 116 per cent of the cut; a decrease of 2.6 per cent in inventories and unfilled orders showing an increase of more than 20 per cent.

The \$4 tariff on rough lumber, the association said, has apparently almost eliminated British Columbia mills from the California and Atlantic coast water trades.

A belief the federal home loan bank system will lead to a revival of small house construction was credited with giving the lumber trade hope for better times.

Springfield Asks For Reduced Rates

Springfield people are signing a petition circulated for lower water and electric rates in that city. One of the men interested who was in Eugene Friday said that a large majority of the residents there had signed the petition.

They are asking that the minimum rate for water be reduced from \$1.50 to \$1 a month for residential use, that the minimum for irrigation be reduced from \$3 to \$2 a season and that the minimum for lights be reduced from 8 cents per kilowatt to 5 cents.

The Mountain States Power company owns and operates both the water and light plants at Springfield.
