

Wheat Up 3 Cents Here Bears Dominate Stocks

55 CENTS BUSHEL BEING PAID HERE FOR LOCAL CROP

The rise in the wheat market in the middle west is reflected in the local markets and an advance of three cents a bushel was reported here Saturday. The Eugene Mill and Elevator company was paying 55c a bushel. Threshing in Lane county is now general and it has been found that the local product is of good quality, perhaps better than it has been for a year or two past.

Hay has about ceased arriving in the local markets, an excellent crop having been put away in Lane county.

The market in eggs, butter and buttermilk, poultry and livestock were all steady Saturday.

In the vegetable line buyers were paying 12 cents a dozen for sweet corn, a drop of 3 cents from previous quotations.

SHARP REACTION IN WALL STREET WEEKEND REPORT

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Bears took their profits on the sharp reaction in the stock market today, their repurchases given the list strong support in the late dealings.

The market ran into a backwash of selling from yesterday's slump in the second hour, and a number of issues were carried down about 1 to 5 points in extension of the even sharper losses of the previous session. But further losses were almost wholly regained under the influence of short covering and fresh buying in the last hour, and many issues recorded gains of fractions on net over the previous close, but selling was resumed in the final dealings and most leaders closed with small losses.

OUTDOOR TOMATOES AT PUBLIC MART

Outdoor grown Lane county tomatoes have appeared at the Producers' Public Market and were selling Saturday at 5 cents a pound. The crop is good this year and if the warm weather continues they will be more plentiful in a short time.

Cabbage was up half a cent a pound Saturday, selling at 2 1/2 cents. String beans were down 1 cent, selling at 3 cents and other varieties at 2 1/2 cents. Green peppers are more plentiful than for some time past and the prevailing price Saturday was 10 cents a pound.

A lot of nice peaches were displayed at retailing at 15 to 20 cents a basket and apples were priced at 4 cents a pound.

Chicago Grain Hit By Downward Trend

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—Unable to stem a decided downward trend, wheat tumbled to new depths in the last half hour of trading today.

Advances were difficult to maintain, and served but to bring about increased pressure to sell. Stop loss orders were forced into execution, despite prospects of a further decrease of the amount of wheat on ocean passage to importing countries.

Wheat closed unsettled, 8 1/2 @ 1 1/8 off yesterday's finish, corn 1 1/8 @ 1/2 off, oats at 1/2 @ 3/8 decline, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 25 cents.
