4-H GIRLS COME HERE FOR ANNUAL CANNING CLASSES

Sixty Four-H club girls from all parts of the northwest section of the county came to Eugene Monday for the annual canning school conducted by state and county Four-H leaders. The girls, many of them excellent canners themselves, flocked to the third floor of the McMoran and Washburne store to hear Miss Helen Cowgill, assistant state club leader, explain correct methods of canning and demonstrate the work.

When the girls left in the afternoon they had canned more than 75 jars of fruit and vegetables.

During the morning peaches and plums were canned and in the afternoon the Four-Hers put up beans.

Preparation of jars and fruit, packing of the jars, sealing and testing methods were studied. A display of the canned products will be arranged in one of the store windows of McMoran and Washburne soon.

"The purpose of the school," said Miss Cowgill, "is to encourage all the Four-H club members to use fruit now for winter use. In these times, everyone should can fruit, and the young people of the county should be just as active as their mothers."

Girls from Eugene, Junction City, Springfield, Norato, Harpole, Pleasant Hill, Trent, Jasper, River Road, Santa Clara, Edenvale, Dexter, Creswell and Bethel attended.

Tuesday southern Lane county girls will hear Miss Cowgill at Cottage Grove. The school is to be held at Fifth and Main streets. Wednesday Portage will have a school for girls of western Lane county.

BURNETT LUCKIEST HITTER IN MAJORS

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—(NEA)—Johnny Burnett isn't the best hitter in the American League. He isn't the worst either. He's just the luckiest, right or left-handed, American or National.

One day under fortune's benign smile has given the young Cleveland shortstop a world record in baseball. It will remain a record at least until another batter with more luck than Johnny's comes along. It may stand for all time.

Burnett belted nine hits in 11 times at the plate in the marathon affair between the Indians and the Athletics. The game lasted 18 innings.

Hits to All Corners
Johnny opened his lucky streak with a smash that was too hot for Second Baseman Dibs Williams to handle. He was back in the second with a single to left and again in the fourth with another one-baser to left. In the fifth he pulled one around to right field for a double. He opened the seventh with his fifth straight hit, a single to right, and then ended his streak and the inning at the same time by fanning for the third out.

Starting anew in the ninth, Burnett again handcuffed Williams with a single. He whaled into one in the 11th that lacked only a pound or two of being a home run. It struck him on the right field screen and dropped back for a two-bagger. His eighth hit was a single to center in the 13th. His ninth, and the fourth straight in his second run, was a single to right in the 16th inning. Then the bubble burst. Centerfielder Hans camped under his long fly in the 17th.

Robbie's Record
As far as record books go, your Uncle Wilbert Robinson formerly held the lucky batting championship. Back in 1902, just 40 years and one month ahead of Burnett's orgy, Robbie poked six singles and one double in seven times at bat for the old Baltimore Orioles, then of the National league.

Forty-four players are credited with the feat of making six hits in six times at bat. Only nine have equaled that record in the last 10 years. Paul Waner of the Pirates was the last to perform the trick with three singles, two doubles and one triple in a 1928 game. Tris Speaker, who set the major league record of 11 consecutive hits, took up four games to do it.

Although Burnett broke a record, his hits weren't particularly valuable, except to his private batting average. He moved up exactly 21 percentage points from an even .300, but scored only four times and batted in only two runs. Several of the other 21 players in the same contest bettered that in two punches.

Cheap Investment
Burnett is only 25. He hasn't cost the Indians a cent, aside from salary.

two large distributors of buying Grade A raw milk only, milk that has been cooled before it is brought to the creamery, has cut down the producers' market. They are at present selling their grade B product to one creamery only. Their grade A pasteurized milk, this is expected to be discussed at the meeting at the chamber of commerce, although officials would not comment on what might be done on this proposed project.

The Meade Land creamery, according to Mr. Lee, has offered producers a price of 20 cents a pound of butterfat for their product. This will be acted upon also.

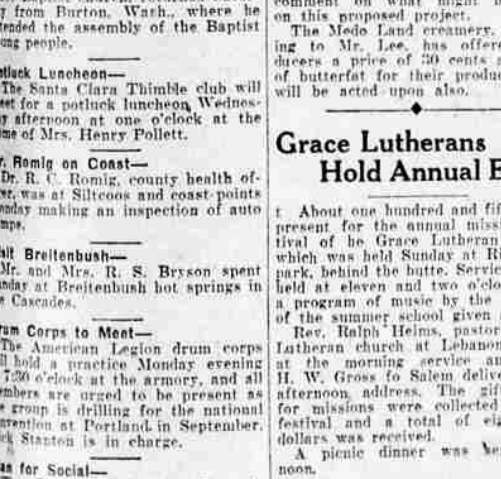
