

EUGENE SCHOOLS TO BE OPERATED WITH LESS HELP

The appointment of committees was announced, the school calendar approved, and the purchase of supplies authorized at the school board meeting held at the city hall Monday evening.

Superintendent H. R. Good was instructed to prepare a budget for the coming year, and preliminary steps toward the adoption of a budget will be taken at a special meeting to be called between now and the next regular meeting Sept. 12.

Following are the committee appointments announced by Chairman E. M. Drexler: building, Ed Bailey and Mrs. W. D. Smith; finance, A. A. Rogers and Ed Bailey; teachers, Mrs. W. D. Smith and Dr. Harry Titus; and education, Dr. Titus and A. A. Rogers.

The resignation of Anne Halliburton, first grade teacher at the Francis Willard school, was accepted. Miss Halliburton is to be married.

Three vacancies in the staff which would normally be filled will not be this year, according to the board's plans, and the present organization will be spread out to absorb this work.

A special meeting will probably be held soon for preliminary consideration of the budget and for the appointment of a budget committee. The procedure to be followed in the appointment of a committee of freeholders equal in number to the board members. This will make a group of 10 to consider the budget to be presented by Superintendent Good.

The board approved the purchase of supplies for janitors, textbooks and science equipment.

The school calendar as approved by the board follows:

School to open Sept. 12 and close June 2. Vacations to be held Oct. 6 and 7 for teachers' institute; November 11 for Armistice day; November 24 and 25 for Thanksgiving; December 24 to January 2 inclusive for Christmas vacation; March 18 to 26 inclusive for spring vacation.

Quality First Objective

When asked what his policy in regard to price would be, E. U. Lee, secretary of the Eugene Milk Producers' association, made this statement:

"The price question is not to be considered first. Quality is the first consideration. But we will make a strong bid for business. The price will be regulated according to the public's ability to pay and the quality of milk produced."

E. F. McDoyle, president, said:

"We have got to take action to get a better market for our milk. We see a possibility for a better market in the future, and believe the future of our enterprise is assured."

What their actual price will be cannot be determined until further organization is made and the directors adopt a price policy.

ALL FOR AGGRESSIVE

At the Monday meeting, the 27 of the 31 members present unanimously stood for making an aggressive bid for milk business. The question of making a deliberate stand or dropping out of the organization was put to them by leaders and they decided to keep themselves very much in the milk market, and build their own plant to accomplish this.

It is generally agreed on all sides of the milk market that the fine quality of local milk will be maintained, whatever turns the price situation may take.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—(AP)—With New York by John Nance Garner, democratic vice-presidential nominee, will drive Texas into the republican column again this fall.

PORTLAND WHEAT Not Very Steady

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 16.—(AP)—While the May option was up 1/2 cent today, December was unchanged and September 1/2 cent lower. This gave the cash committee on the merchants' exchange a chance to cut the price of spot wheat by 1/2 cent.

Sales of futures included 34,000 bushels of it being changed from September and December.

Reports in the trade say that confirmation is now practically available that the farm board is going to finance around \$20,000,000 in wheat to China on long term credit, which will give the government co-operative a chance to purchase a big block of stock at a profit. The private firms will practically be shut out of the oriental business as a result, according to the feeling in the trade.
