

COUNTER CHARGES TO BE FILED SOON BY GROVE PASTOR

Counter charges on grounds of defamatory libel will be filed against certain unnamed individuals as a result of the immigration charges now faced by Rev. Duncan P. Cameron, pastor of the Presbyterian church of Cottage Grove, the minister announced Tuesday. He refused to divulge the names of the persons against whom such charges would be filed.

Pending appearance of a defense witness, the hearing of Rev. Mr. Cameron being held at Portland on charges of illegal entry into the United States, was adjourned Monday, and the minister returned to his home. It is expected that the hearing will be resumed in about 10 days when it will take but a short time to wind up the evidence.

"These charges are the result of personal spite and I intend to show up the individuals responsible for them," declared the Grove minister Tuesday. "When the hearing in Portland is terminated, I expect to file charges based on defamatory character against those individuals."

The minister declared he was "amazed" at the action of the federal immigration authorities in giving so much credence to private complaints and in pursuing their attack upon him so vigorously on these complaints.

"The complete manner in which Mr. Norene has delivered the Portland office of the immigration authorities to private individuals to vent their spite and jealousy on a citizen who has given several years to the service of the community, the state and nation is amazing to me and to my friends," he declared. "The last word, fortunately, is not with the Portland office but with headquarters at Washington, D. C."

The hearing in Portland was conducted before Roy Norene, assistant district immigration director, who adjourned the hearing after listening to testimony all Monday forenoon. Immigration authorities arrested Rev. Mr. Cameron in Cottage Grove May 27 on the charge of illegal entry to the United States and the federal grand jury indicted the minister for falsely representing himself as an American citizen in July. The indictment charged the minister with "fraudulently representing himself as a native of Nebraska in registering for an election." He is also said to have voted in the last election and to have entered his name as a candidate for precinct committeeman in the May primaries this year.

Immigration officials claim the minister was born in Canada, entering this country in 1926. He is alleged to have been convicted for forging and cashing a check in Calgary, Alberta, and served four months of a 16-month sentence. The minister, in defense, claims he was born in Nebraska when his parents were there on a visit.

In refusing to name the individuals against whom his charges will be filed, Rev. Mr. Cameron hinted at blackmail activities and declared that a Eugene man would be involved in the proceedings.

Muskrat Trapping Permits Revoked By State Game Board

GLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Permits held by the California-Oregon Power company and the United States reclamation service to trap muskrats in Klamath county were ordered revoked today by the state game commission in session here.

The commission met this morning prior to a joint session later in the day with members of the California commission and the directors of the Elkharta Cascade Wonderland association.

The revocation was based on the understanding that the power company had granted the Washington Fur Farms company the exclusive privilege under its permit. This was regarded as commercialization of the permit, Marion Barnes of the state police in charge of game law enforcement in Klamath county expressed the opinion that reports of damage done to dikes and dams by muskrats are exaggerated. He thought that field mice are far more destructive.

Superintendent and Director of Research Fosh were instructed to make an investigation of the feasibility of establishing a game refuge near Seio for the propagation of Chinese pheasants. A revision of the license forms to be used for the season of 1935 was ordered. The object sought was to obtain a better check on the amount of game killed. For the coming deer season instructions were given that only one tag will be required for mule deer.

5000 EXPECTED AT BENTON-LANE PARK

Preparations for a crowd of 5000 persons are being made at Benton-Lane park for the big tri-county picnic scheduled for Sunday, Aug. 18, according to chamber of commerce officials who visited the park Sunday to confer with Manager Mallory. The chamber group called on garage and cafe owners in Monroe and Junction City, all of whom were enthusiastic in their support of the affair.

Eugene will contribute a band of 24 pieces which will open the program promptly at 3 p. m. with a concert lasting one hour. At 4 p. m. Dr. W. E. Buchanan's chamber of commerce entertainers will put on their show which will last for approximately one and one-half hours. Following the entertainment will be Carl Baker's motion picture show for an hour. Interspersed in this program will be several numbers by groups from Harrisburg, Junction City and Monroe. Dancing in the big pavilion will occupy the remainder of the evening.

All people living in southern Lane, Benton and northern Lane counties are being invited to the picnic management. Picnic tickets will be dropped in front of the pavilion and those attending are urged to arrive at noon. Mayors of the towns and chamber of commerce presidents will take part in a short speaking program starting at 2 p. m. Local speaking equipment will be provided. From 2:30 to 3 p. m. will be devoted to games for boys and girls.

ANOTHER ANCIENT CITY IS REVEALED IN 'MAYA EMPIRE'

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—(AP)—America's demand for chewing gum has uncovered in Mexican jungles a lost city that 1,500 years ago was a metropolis of an Egypt-like civilization.

Great pyramids and the ruins of temples and palaces in which a teeming population once lived have been found buried in what is now uninhabited, almost impassable jungle, by an expedition of the Carnegie Institution of Washington.

Native chewing gum hunters, who explored the region for chicle, the "chewing" part of chewing gum, first found the ruins said the Carnegie Institution in announcing the find today.

The city, named "Calakmul," by C. L. Lundell, the first American to visit it, was built at the height of the vanished civilization of the "old empire" of the Mayas. Soon after the time of Christ they developed what many archeologists call the most brilliant of the ancient Indian civilizations of America.

Mayans carved dates on their buildings that have been deciphered, and the dates at Calakmul indicate that the city flourished from 234 A. C. to 551 A. D. It may have been 2,000 years later, however, as archeologists differ in their interpretation of the Maya dates.

Calakmul is in the Yucatan peninsula of Mexico, just over the northern border of Guatemala, where the Maya "old empire" originated. The two largest pyramids in Calakmul are 150 feet high and it has many other ancient monuments. The people of the city erected a dated monument every five years.
