Hop Growers Out For State Repeal

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 17.—(AP)—Repeal of the state dry law is a main concern of Oregon hop growers. Discussion of means to repeal prohibition featured the meeting here Tuesday of the Oregon Hop Growers' association executive committee, delegates from all hop growing sections of the state being present.
A movement to enlist all growers in a program to improve quality of Oregon hops was favored. Progress in research devoted to suppression of hop diseases was indicated by specialists from Oregon State college.

PUBLICITY GIVEN ON R. F. C. LOANS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Contrary to the expectation of President Hoover, the clerk of the House intends to make public the details of loans made by the reconstruction corporation since July 21.

The corporation's first report on the loans is due to be submitted to congress this week. South Trimble, house clerk, has written an eight-page brief giving his reasons for interpreting the relief law as making publicity mandatory.

Trimbles feels, as do Speaker Garner and Representative Rainey, democratic leader, that he has no choice. He disagrees that further congressional action is necessary.

The publicity provision got the relief bill into a snarl that threatened to prevent adjournment. At the insistence of Garner and Rainey, the measure included instructions that monthly reports of loans should be transmitted to the clerk of the house and the secretary of the senate.

President Hoover asked leaders of both parties that the publicity phase be omitted, but the measure was passed by a vote of 219 to 197. The president favored "fullest publicity" to all government activities but that the directors of the relief corporation advised the president of the danger that would result to the credit structure if this publicity provision were insisted upon.

"The responsibility in the last analysis for whatever might happen must necessarily rest upon congress," the statement said.

Two men were sent to the fire, and it was believed it was under control. The Western Lumber company men at the camp near Westport put out the fire Tuesday night which threatened their equipment for a time.

The Cascade forest fires were reported extinguished at the office and no new ones had been discovered. The Snellstrom forest had no fires.

F. P. Walker Dead; Long in Politics

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17.—(AP)—Franklin Pierce Walker, 50, for many years prominently identified with republican politics in Oregon, died at his home here yesterday. He had been ill only a few days.

Despite his age, Walker continued active in political life, and last week attended a meeting of the republican central committee here. He was a former roadmaster of Multnomah county, and former city commissioner.

His widow, two sons, Charles N. and Clarence C. Walker, and a daughter, Mrs. Mary Stewart, survive.

MACADAMIZING OF CHESHIRE PUT OFF

Macadamizing of the Cheshire-Prairie road section of the Siuslaw highway was postponed Wednesday by the state highway department until spring, but Lane county motorists will have a good gravel road to use this winter anyhow.

The office of R. H. Baldock, chief state highway engineer, sent County Surveyor P. M. Morse said that the final surfacing would not be done this winter, as county officials thought, but will be finished early next spring.

Work of grading is now in progress on the Cheshire section. Fills are being erected and several bridges built. County Surveyor P. M. Morse said that under the present contract it is certain that the road will be opened probably within 30 days, and that one coat of gravel will be put on.

He said the state is undoubtedly holding back the macadamizing only to allow the fills time to settle, and that there will be no real delay in completing the road. When the grading is done and prime coat of gravel is applied, the motorists will have a good road, he said.

Engineers are having difficulty in building fills near Cushman on account of the sand conditions, and as the west end of the Siuslaw will not be finished there will be no real hurry for a macadamized section in the east.

RUSSIANS ORDERED OUT OF MANCHURIA

CHANGCHUN, MANCHURIA, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The foreign commissioner of the Manchukuo government at Harbin today filed a protest with the Soviet consul general demanding that the Russian government cease what it called "invasions of Manchuria."

The protest asked that Soviet trenches and barbed wire entanglements at Manchuria be "demolished," and that Soviet forces withdraw to a safe distance to avoid the danger of fighting.

At Mukden it was understood among Japanese leaders that Russia has advised the Chinese government at Peking to continue defending the province of Jehol against threatened Japanese military operations, by "use of guerrilla bands in Manchuria." This purportedly was to prevent the spread of the Manchukuo government's influence into outer Mongolia.
