YOUR CHILDREN

DO you know your vegetables? It's amazing to realize that there are more than fifty varieties of vegetables generally cultivated and marketed. Out of these fifty it should be easy to find plenty to please the family taste. While these naturally are not always obtainable at this season of the year, the choice is particularly wide.

Perhaps one of the best ways to learn vegetables is to go to market and whenever you see something with which you aren't familiar ask the market man what it is and how to cook or use it. He'll tell you every time. Then take some home and follow his instructions.

Leeks and sweet fennel are two vegetables seldom used by the average home-maker. Leeks belong to the onion family but are more delicately flavored. They are used for seasoning in soups and salads, or the lower white portion is trimmed and cooked and served with butter or white sauce.

Florence fennel or Finocchio is used extensively in Italy as a salad, but is particularly palatable when served boiled with a cream sauce. It's flavor is somewhat like celery, but has a sweet taste and delicate odor. Try it with a fish menu.

The topeppo is a new vegetable rapidly gaining popularity. It's a cross between a sweet green pepper and a tomato. Of a waxy yellow color, it resembles the tomato in shape and the pepper in texture and flavor. The flesh is thicker than that of the pepper but of the same crisp firmness. It's used raw in salads or stuffed and baked, just as its ancestors are used.

Kohlrabi is a turnip-rooted member of the cabbage tribe. However, it is more delicately flavored than turnips and is of a finer grain and smoother texture. The thick outer covering is removed before cooking. Serve as you would turnips.

Broccoli belongs to the cauliflower family and enjoys a long season. It should be used as soon as possible after cutting, for it loses its delicate flavor if allowed to wilt. If the stalks are thick (as is often the case) a good season of steaming before cooking plan to split them before cooking.

Okra is sometimes cooked like asparagus but is especially good in combination with other vegetables. To make a delicious okra and lima bean stew that is delicious for a hot August dinner when all the other dishes on the menu are chilled. A cold cucumber salad might be chosen for the dessert in order to balance the calories.

Tomorrow's Menu
Breakfast: Baked apples, cereal, cream, scrambled eggs with fried toast, watermelon cocktail, marmalade, milk, coffee.

Luncheon: Stuffed topeppos, creamed celery, peach and raspberry salad, toasted crackers, milk, tea.

Dinner: Watermelon cocktail, grilled salmon steaks, broccoli with butter and lemon juice, endive and cress salad, blueberry pudding, milk, coffee.

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Improvement Seen In Wool Industry

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Financial interests close to the woolen industry now see a faint light on the horizon although it is not yet clear, there are many "ifs" before the present status of the business and a condition approximating stability.

Wool started toward the bottom of the market some time ago, but the first sign of a real pick-up came this year at the London auction when prices firmed all along the line. Both the spot and futures markets show an improvement in the large mills are now making three shillings a day.

In the last month, observers state, the mills have "stepped up" more production, and manufacturers throughout the country except those of boots and shoes are working.
