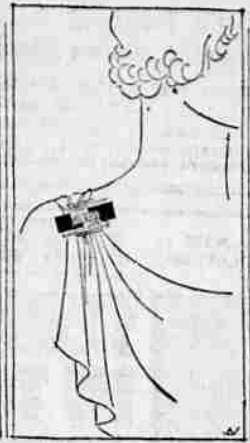


Ent To Be Held At Riverside Park

A basket dinner was served at noon and the following program was given: Two readings by Mrs. Maude Pratt Smith of Corvallis, two Iowa state songs led by Mrs. Maude P. Smith, talk on patriotism by F. L. Post of Corvallis, two vocal numbers by R. J. Wright, with reading.

A letter from the Vancouver, Washington club extending an invitation to the Oregon-Iowa residents to attend the picnic at Levee park on August 10 was read. Champagne park, historic spot near Salem was chosen as the next meeting place.

Officers were elected for the following year and are: C. S. Millsap of Corvallis, president; A. A. Nichols, Dayton, vice-president; C. R. Tyler of Yamhill, secretary; H. C. Farley, Eugene, treasurer; Clyde Millsap, acting as manager for the past three years.

Through the united efforts of four Corvallis residents, Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Jenkins and Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Millsap, formerly of Leon, Ore., the first Willamette valley Iowa picnic was held at Corvallis, September 7, 1930, with one hundred former Iowa residents as guests.

Dr. C. A. Anderson presided at the meeting. A short program was held and officers elected for the next year. W. C. Blummaster of Corvallis was elected president of the new organization and Mrs. S. A. Lindsay treasurer and secretary. The second picnic, held August 6, 1931, at Benton-Lane park, attracted nearly five hundred Oregon residents, all former Iowans.

Eugene was the only town represented at the picnic having an active Iowa club, meeting every month. The Eugene club has eighty members, a number of them being charter members of many years ago. Many people are not aware of the fine program of relief work being carried on by the club. A definite amount of money is set aside each month to help needy and destitute families in Eugene and many of the individual members are helping in the relief work also, giving food, clothing and canned goods.

TODAY'S RECIPES

PEARS of some variety are in the market almost the whole year through, but the delicious Bartlett pear is at its best during August and September. Many other high quality varieties follow the Bartlett, prolonging the season into the late fall.

In spite of their seeming sweetness, pears are somewhat acid and consequently are an excellent tonic fruit. Their flavor is refreshing, tending to tone up a tired summer appetite. Used fresh in salads, fruit cups and desserts, or as a breakfast fruit, they provide a welcome change.

Unlike most fruits, pears are best picked green and allowed to ripen in storage. In this way the fruit develops better flavor and finer texture than tree-ripened. In choosing pears, those on the verge of greenness rather than ripeness are desirable.

Baked Pears
Baked pears may be prepared like

baked apples and are especially good for breakfast with bacon and eggs. If wanted for dessert, they can be pared and cored, sprinkled with sugar and baked, covered, in a moderate oven for an hour.

Served with whipped cream and ginger cookies, they make an inviting last course for an August dinner. Two tablespoons sugar for each pear makes the fruit pleasantly sweet for the average taste. A little powdered ginger mixed with the sugar adds zest to the fruit, too.

Fritters made with pears are very good, too. Served with ginger sauce, near fritters make a fitting dessert for a September vegetable dinner. Pare fruit and cut in very thin slices. Drop into fritter batter and fry in deep hot fat.

Breakfast: Chilled melon balls, oatmeal, cream, broiled tomatoes, popovers, milk, coffee.

Luncheon: Sweet corn soufflé, creamed green peppers, chilled baked pears with whipped cream, ginger cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner: Steamed haddock, shoe-string potatoes, creamed green beans, cucumber and lettuce salad, sautéed pears in chocolate sauce, milk, coffee.

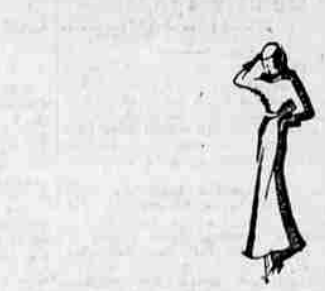

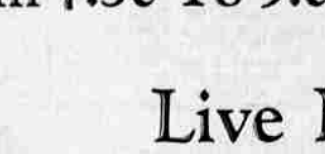
