Strawberry Of High Quality Is Grown Here

Devising methods to create better runners for Rockhill No. 20 strawberry plants, recognized by authorities as one of the best grades of everbearing strawberries so far developed, S. E. Fish, who lives north of Eugene, near Cal Young's place, has developed this plant till he has created a world market for his product.

Mr. Fish first received his plants from Iowa, about ten years ago. He was uncertain as to the variety and first called his plant the Bonanza Everbearing. Recently, Dr. George Parrow, chief of the pomological department of Oregon State college, visited the Fish farm and identified the plant as the Rockhill type.

The plant yields a fairly large berry, sometimes two inches in diameter which has a superior flavor. Mr. Fish has received orders from all over the United States, Canada, England and Yugoslavia.

Before Mr. Fish started his study of the plant it had not been greatly successful due to the lack of runners grown on the plant. By observing the plant's characteristics and habits of growth, Fish developed the runner-making capacities of the plants and since producing the new form has drawn wide recognition for the plant.

Dr. Parrow, in a recent article in the Better Fruit magazine, recommends the Rockhill plant as the best everbearing strawberry yet developed. The berry is large, those brought to the Register-Guard office Friday being nearly two inches in diameter. The plant is a heavy yielder, bearing a full crop the same season they are set out.
