

THE BANK IN FIVE HELPED IN CRISIS BY R. F. C. CREDIT

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Aug. 19.—One bank out of every five in the nation has borrowed money from the reconstruction finance corporation, according to a report of the Secretary of the Treasury today.

The report, which is the first of its kind, is based on a survey of the banks of the United States made by the Federal Reserve Board in the first six months of the year.

It shows that the banks have borrowed a total of \$1,219,000,000 from the reconstruction finance corporation.

The distribution of loans was as follows:

necessary where the rolling character of the ground does not lend itself to inundation.

A farm where the strip-bordertype of flooding was viewed, cost of installation was placed at about \$35 per acre. On one piece of pasture land under this type of irrigation, 50 cows were being pastured on 20 acres of land with about 40 acres.

According to Arthur S. Kutz, extension specialist in soil, the progress of irrigation has been somewhat hampered due to the general opinion that there was plenty of moisture from rain in the Willamette valley. He explains this theory by pointing to the weather records kept over a period of 40 years which show the average rainfall during the four growing months of May, June, July and August to be but four and one-half inches.

Approximately 1,200,000 acres of land in the Willamette valley will respond to irrigation, King declared.

is estimated as adaptable to irrigation: Washington, 147,000; Yamhill, 108,000; Polk, 112,000; Benton, 103,000; Lane, 133,000. County Agent Fletcher, in describing the progress of Lane county irrigation to members of the tour, said that in 1925 there was less than 125 acres of truck gardening under irrigation, while in 1932 there was an estimated 800 acres of truck gardening under irrigation.

At the Chase gardens the four members saw the pioneers of irrigation in this county. F. B. Chase installed what is thought to be the first pumping system in the county in 1896. Irrigation did not progress rapidly in this county, Fletcher explained, till 1925 when the Eugene Fruit Growers' association noted the superior quality of irrigated produce and began to urge more irrigation.
