

SUNSET HOME HAS ANNUAL ALL-DAY RALLY HERE SUNDAY

The annual rally of the Sunset Home for elderly persons was a successful event of Sunday with a large number attending, including many from out of the city. The rally is held to give people throughout the state an opportunity to become acquainted with the home and its work. A spacious platform with adequate accommodations was constructed especially for the occasion at the Sunset park, Thirteenth and Olive.

Rev. J. M. Jensen, of Silverton, vice president of the Sunset Home board of directors, opened the program with a few fitting words of welcome and appreciation of the home as a place for elderly persons who have no homes to spend their declining years.

Rev. P. O. Braland, city missionary and secretary of the pan-Lutheran welfare work in Portland, delivered the sermon. He showed how the patriarchs of the Bible were glad to come home after strenuous life to rest in a home under the protection of the Lord. The Sunset Home was intended for such a rest haven.

At the close of the sermon, the audience proceeded to the chapel at 1251 Charleston street where Rev. H. Rosen of Woodburn, president of the board of directors, gave a short sermon and dedicated the building for divine services. The other buildings were erected to provide for the physical needs of the aged and the chapel was constructed for spiritual needs. Mrs. H. Rosen sang two solos "In Heaven Above" and "The Pilgrim's Journey."

Lunch was served at noon and those who had been invited to take part in the program were entertained in the dining hall while other guests dined in the park. The Junior chamber of commerce took the visitors, who had not previously seen Eugene, on a tour of the city.

The afternoon program opened with prayer by Rev. Frank S. Belsel, pastor of the United Lutheran church, after which Judge Lawrence T. Harris was introduced by S. P. News, attorney of Portland and legal adviser of the Sunset Home board. Judge Harris gave an excellent address explaining the Zorn-Macpherson bill. That his speech was timely and much appreciated was evidenced by the eagerness of the audience to procure a copy of the pamphlet published by the school tax-saving association of Portland.

Vatican Charges Denied at Moscow

MOSCOW, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Observatore Romano's statement that the Soviet government has secretly ordered liquidation of all churches by the end of 1935 was officially characterized today as "absolutely false" and proof of an anti-Soviet campaign by the vatican organ.

Numerous abandoned churches are being demolished, it was found, but many others continue to flourish under a Soviet law permitting worship in all those with sufficient congregations to justify operation.

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
