DISABLED VETERANS
OPPOSED TO SCHOOL
GRABBING MEASURE

The school grab measure which seeks to take the university away from Eugene was opposed by the Disabled American Veterans of the World war at their state convention in McMinnville, Aug. 5.

W. J. Green of Eugene, a member of the resolutions committee, submitted the following resolution, which was approved:

"We do oppose the present stated plan of consolidating the University of Oregon and Oregon State college. We believe it to be to the best interests of the present and future students of this state that these institutions be maintained in the way they now are."

The veterans passed other resolutions opposing wage cuts, thanking Senator Frederick W. Steiwer for adding veterans' legislation, endorsing payment of the tombstone bonus, attacking the Economy league, asking that the state be given the work of locating settlers on homesteads, and urging that forest land be opened to disabled veterans.

The resolution opposing wage cuts was placed second to the school resolution.

"Further wage cuts offer no remedy or cure for the depression. Wage cuts mean a continuance of hard times as the purchasing power is destroyed. The price of farm crops and manufactured articles must be governed by the amount of money the working class has to spend. Wage reductions mean that we must lower the American standard of living. We ask the support of all groups, farmers, laborers, and fraternal organizations, in our fight to maintain a reasonable wage, believing that prosperity is dependent on the amount of money that the wage earner has to spend."

K. K. K. Opposes
Party Platforms
At Grove Meeting

Criticism of the republican party platform and condemnation of the democratic plank along with the democratic presidential candidate were voiced at a meeting of the Ku Klux Klan at Cottage Grove at the Odd Fellows hall Monday night as speakers envisioned the appointment of Al Smith as secretary of state and John Rankin as secretary of the treasury in the event of Roosevelt's election.

Klansmen from Eugene, Cottage Grove, Santa Clara and Creswell gathered at the meeting in full Klan regalia with an attendance estimated at more than 100. Resolutions condemning the two party planks and expressing opposition to further cancellation of foreign obligations were drawn up and sent to national headquarters of the Klan.

After the business meeting the Klansmen went to the W. O. W. hall where women of the K. K. K. served a midnight lunch of doughnuts and coffee. The next meeting place was not announced but it was understood it would be in Eugene.

MANY THOUSANDS
OF HYMNALS WILL
BE SHIPPED SOON

(From Kingsport (Tenn.) Times)
The Kingsport Press, Incorporated, has received the largest known single order of hymnals ever placed with a single concern. The order was placed by The Christian Science Publishing Society of Boston.

The order consists of 400,000 cloth-bound books and 10,000 de luxe full leather-bound books. The books will be distributed throughout the world. It is expected the distribution will begin about Sept. 1.

The music plates for the 640-page hymnal were prepared by the E. R. Gilson company of Boston, nationally known music composers. All of the type for the plates was set by hand. E. W. Palmer, president of the local plant, said some idea of the magnitude of the order could be obtained by the quantity of material and time necessary for the completion of the book. Five of the largest perfecting presses of the Kingsport Press began work on printing the book June 15 and will run 20 hours each day until Aug. 25, at which time the printing is expected to be completed.

A total of 325 tons of paper will be used in the book, 40,240 yards of book cloth, 39,000 yards of head bands, seven tons of end paper material, 50 tons of cover board, and more than 210,000 yards of muslin reinforcement for the backs of the books.

Mr. Palmer said probably the most outstanding part of the manufacturing process will be the use of more than 500,000 sheets of 22-carat gold for the stamping on the cloth-bound edition and gilding the edges and stamping the de luxe edition. Mr. Palmer estimated the cost of the gold alone at \$12,500.
