

DEBATE SLOWS UP LABOR CONVENTION

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 25.—(AP)—A proposal to elect officers of the Oregon State Federation of Labor by direct vote from the floor of the convention, rather than by referendum after nominations have been made at the annual meeting, was before the federation convention here today and was expected to result in lengthy debate which would further delay adjournment, planned for tomorrow.

An unusually heavy program has put the convention considerably behind schedule. Yesterday's meeting was advanced an hour in an attempt to recover lost time.

The federation agreed to establish definite convention dates to be held at the next convention, to be effective on the second Monday of August of each year.

Other resolutions were sent to the chair Wednesday, adding to the unprecedented accumulation. One favored organization of all crafts in Roseburg in connection with the construction of the federal soldiers hospital there. Others favored creation of a state bank; establishment of public unemployment insurance, and halting further taxing of truck lines as tending to cripple the trucking business.

The committee on taxation reported that "we should look forward to the time when all state and municipal taxes will be removed, except those on incomes, inheritances and for such specialized purposes as the gasoline tax, which is levied for a specific purpose which the people approve and know for what purpose it is used."
