Obituaries
Mrs. Jennie Eakin Hanna
Mrs. Jennie Eakin Hanna, widow of the late Calvin Hanna, passed away at noon, August 25, at the Pacific Christian hospital. She was born at Bloom (now Chicago Heights), Illinois, December 19, 1849. In the fall of 1865 her father S. B. Eakin Sr. made plans to move his family to Oregon where his sisters, Mrs. Andrew McCormack and Mrs. Robert Pattison and families were already located near Eugene.
On April 23, 1896, Mr. Eakin, with his aged parents, and his family left Bloom in wagons drawn by mule teams. The daughter, later, Mrs. Hanna, drove one of these sturdy teams. At the Mississippi, they joined the wagon train of one Captain Smith for the perilous trip over plain and mountains. The Eakin family reached Eugene, August 25, completing the journey in the then first time of four months, and settling on a farm about three miles west of Eugene.
On January 26, 1870, Jennie Eakin was married to Calvin Hanna of Corvallis. A few years later they moved to Eugene where their five children attended the University of Oregon from which all were graduated except Calvin, Jr., who died in 1897. The four surviving children are Willis (Mrs. W. G.) Beattie, E. E. Hanna, Katherine (Mrs. C. E.) Beister of Cottage Grove, Herbert R. Hanna of La Grande, and Stuart R. Hanna of Long Beach, Cal.
Other living relatives of Mrs. Hanna are two brothers, Herbert Eakin of Cottage Grove and Walter T. Eakin of Astoria; four grandchildren and one great grandchild, besides numerous nephews, nieces and cousins. Mrs. Hanna joined what is now Central Presbyterian church in Eugene in 1896, and was very active in that organization until advancing years and impaired health compelled her to relinquish her activities.
Funeral services will be held from the Veatch chapel, Saturday, August 27 at 2 o'clock with Rev. Milton S. Weber of the Central Presbyterian church officiating. Interment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

The boys were brought into justice court on a district attorney's information charging burglary not in a dwelling. They were bound over to juvenile court on bail of \$100 each and turned over to the sheriff. A hearing will be held Monday at 10 a. m. Although in the county jail, they are being kept apart from the older prisoners.
